

**Certifications Mailed
to Oregon County Clerks**

Secretary of State Sam A. Koser has mailed to the county clerks of Oregon for their use in preparing the election ballots, a certification form showing that provision must be made for the election of a justice of the supreme court to fill the vacancy

caused by the resignation of Justice Alfred S. Bennett, and an attorney general to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of George M. Brown.

Governor Olcott has appointed Brown to fill the vacancy on the supreme bench and L. H. Van Winkle to fill the vacancy in the attorney general's office, but under the law the appointments hold only until January and it is necessary for the succeeding officials to be elected in November.

The names must be written in on the ballot which will provide space for the writing of one name for each office. Judge Brown will be a candidate for the supreme bench and Mr. Van Winkle for the attorney generalship. For the latter post J. C. Bailey also is a candidate. So far Brown has no opposition.

Weather Permitting, Senators and Honeyman's Battle at Oxford Park

Weather conditions permitting, the Salem Senators and the Portland Honeyman team will clash this afternoon at Oxford park to determine the winner of the Oregon baseball classic among independent teams. By their season's record both teams established superiority over other semi-professional teams, and in this, the final game of the championship series, the championship of Oregon is at stake.

Of the three-game championship series two games were played several weeks ago. Each team won a game featured by snappy, spectacular fielding performances and lusterful clouting. Since both teams, according to form displayed in the first two games, possess an infield that performs with deadly, machine-like precision, thus giving the twirlers impregnable support, to choose a winner is hazardous and speculative.

Victories by Small Margins.

In the previous games between the two teams, victory was claimed by each team by a small margin. The Senators won the second game because "Cack" Blanchard lifted a couple of balls over the fence for homers when the bays were populated with Salem runners. The Honeyman team achieved victory in a similar manner.

It was definitely announced yesterday that both teams will retain their strongest men and strengthen the weaknesses by the best semi-pro talent available. It is the opinion of those intimate with the affairs of the contesting clubs that the personnel of the teams presented to Salem fans at Oxford park this afternoon will include men of major and minor league class.

Walter Kracke, skipper of the Senators, announces the addition of two men to the Senator lineup who are of major league caliber. They are Zweifel, hurler, and Bogart, an outfielder. Zweifel and Bogart are to report next season to Cincinnati and the St. Louis Cardinals, respectively, it was recently announced.

Zweifel Is Phenom.

Eddie Zweifel, it is said, was the pitching sensation last summer in the Canadian league. His terrific speed and mystifying twisters earned him a National league berth for next season with the Cincy team. Although Bogart, who played in the outer garden for the Joplin team of the Western league, was not the slugging phenom of his circuit, he is a dependable hitter and dangerous in the pinches. It is said that his hitting kept the Joplin team in the pennant race, and also won for him the opportunity to don a St. Louis Cardinal uniform.

According to dopesters among Salem baseball fans, the Senators, due to the addition of the big league men, are favored to win. With Zweifel serving twisters and supported by the dependable quartet of Eddie Bishop, Mike Miller, Proctor and "Cack" Blanchard, and with the outfield selected from Stewart, Billy Stepp, Hayes and Eddie Bogart, the Senators appear to have a winning combination. It is conceded by close critics of the Senators that the lineup for this afternoon is the strongest to represent the Senators this season.

Portlanders Keep Busy.

On the other hand, the management of the Rose City team did not, while the skies wept, spend the days by the fireside. Billy Stepp, a member of the Senator outfield and chief Senator scout, informs his teammates not to be overconfident, asserting that the Honeyman team has signed up for this afternoon's game the best talent available in Portland. He says that a large delegation of rooters will accompany the team to Salem.

The game this afternoon will close the baseball season for Oregon.

**VARSITY BESTS
ALUMNI SQUAD**

Mathews' Regulars Too Much for Grads and Win by Score of 13 to 0

In one of the best alumni matches ever seen on Sweetland field, the Willamette Behcats yesterday fought the heavy and veteran alumni team to a 13 to 0 score. Never, from the time the ball was first snapped into play until the final whistle did the alumni show themselves the equal of the varsity squad.

The game was marked by very few fumbles upon the part of the varsity and practically no stalling and squabbling on the part of the grads, usually a feature of the initial game. The alumni took the defensive early in the game and relied mostly on straight football for their gains, while Willamette took the offense from the very start, using line plunges, forward passes and trick plays.

Just exactly four minutes after the first kick-off, by a series of line bucks, a 30-yard forward pass to Ganzans and a final charging of the line Zeller carried the pigskin across the line for the first touchdown.

In the second quarter after the alumni had failed to make yardage Willamette took the ball on the 37-yard line and by several bucks and a 15-yard end run by Irvine the oval was again taken across the line. Irvine kicked goal. The first half ended with the ball on the alumni's 10-yard line after Rarey had taken the ball for a 20-yard end run. The

last two quarters were marked by a tightening up of the alumni's defense and by consistent gains upon the part of the varsity but they were never able to carry the ball across. Irvine attempted a place kick which went wide.

For the alumni, Tekoa Grosvenor and Small were the only players who were able to penetrate, even for short gains, the stane wall defense of the varsity. During the last few minutes of play "Pruney" Francis was shifted to backfield and he made several good gains by line plunges. The veterans made several substitutions during the game. Although the old-timers failed to score, it was one of the best alumni aggregations ever seen in action upon the field.

For Willamette it is hard to pick any individual stars for the team played as one matter, holding their line intact when the grads tried to break through, and keeping the ball in their possession the greater part of the game. Zeller was the biggest yard gainer for Willamette and Sherwood and Rarey were good for four or five yards.

Irvine handled the team like a veteran and his long run was a feature of the game. Lawson broke through the line several times and threw the alumni back for several yard losses. Lyman and Ganzans stopped a number of dangerous end runs, Ganzans receiving several forward passes to advantage. Basler broke up a number of plays and passed consistently. It was hard work for the backs to get by Wapato and White and Rarey put up an irresistible defense. The following was the line-up:

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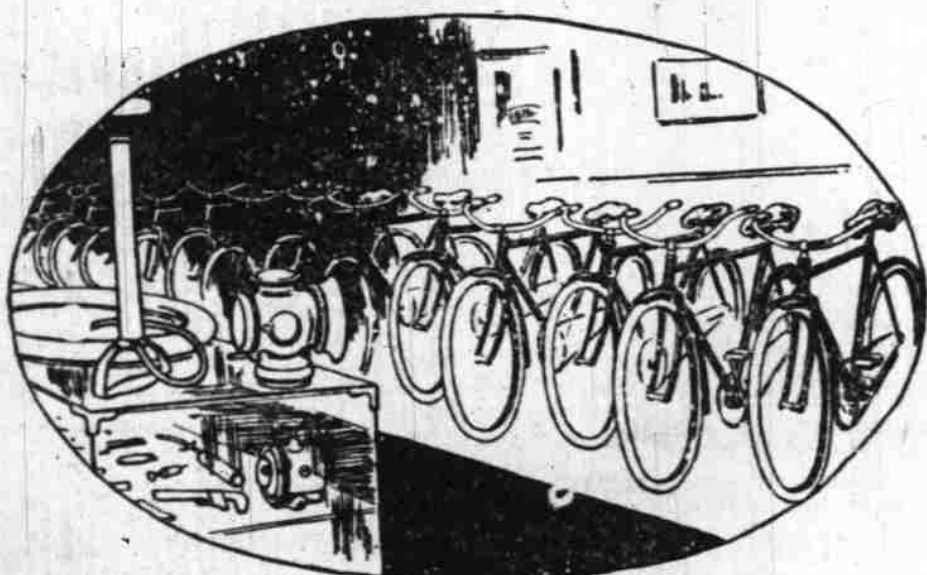

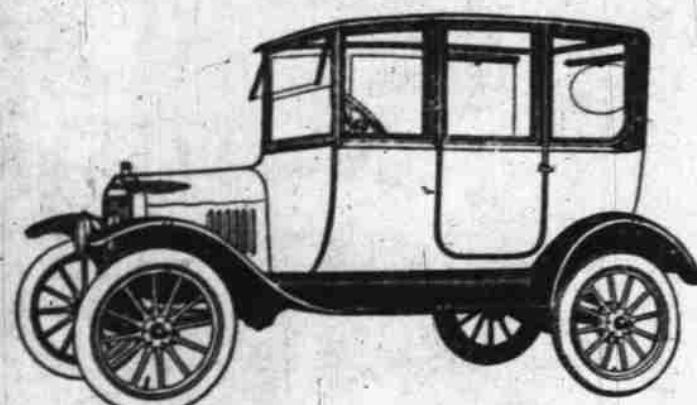
