Robinson Bound Over.—H. C. Robinson, who has been held for the past week in the county jail to answer to charges of assault and battery, assault with a dangerous weapon, and assault with intent to kill, was given a hearing yesterday before Judge Unruh in the justice court. Governor is Speaker at Rotary Luncheon

The regular Wednesday luncheon of the Salem Rotary club, held at noon yesterday at the Hotel Marion, had as its distinctive feature a talk by Governor Olcott, who spoke on the governor's office. He reviewed the establishment of state form of government in 1842, at Champe, and touched upon the four divisions since that time.

Governor Olcott paid a glowing tribute to Warden L. H. Compton, asserting that the state prison, since the latter's taking charge, had practically passed out of the governor's hands and worries,

formerly being one of his most constant annoyances. It was voted yesterday to tax the members the price for their plate at these luncheons, whether the members are present or not, as it was thought that in this way a more liberal attendance could be stimulated. A department head will be the next speaker, the club running the gamut of the different state offices for speakers to address the organization.

Man Hit by Automobile, Left Leg is Fractured

An automobile accident occurred yesterday afternoon at the intersection of Commercial and Center streets which resulted in serious injury to B. G. Crow, who lives at 2495 Laurel street. While driving east on Center street, Rev. W. T. Milliken accidentally ran into Mr. Crow as he attempted to cross the street. The impact of the car threw him heavily to the pavement, causing his left leg to be broken just above the ankle, and also he received a scalp wound and otherwise was injured, the full extent of which is not yet known. Mr. Milliken took the injured man to the Deaconess hospital, where he is being cared for.

In relating the incident Mr. Milliken stated that Mr. Crow, upon seeing the approaching car, appeared to be confused and undecided and that he stepped back in front of the car.

SEATTLE OUT OF RACE
