effectively applying that principle to preserve peace.

"If the proposed changes in the Paris agreement were capacious or without substantial grounds, one might question the sincerity of their advocates. This, however, is not the case.

"The principal change proposed concerns article ten of the league covenant. Mr. Wilson declares this to be the 'heart of the league' and the chief controversy is about this.

"Article ten provides that the nations agreeing to the treaty shall:

"Preserve as against external aggression the territorial integrity and existing political independence of all members of the league."

League Has Obligations.

"This is an obligation of the most vital importance and it certainly binds every nation entering into it to go to war whenever war may be necessary to preserve the territorial integrity or political independence of any member of the league against external aggression."

"It is idle to say that congress has power to refuse to authorize

such a war, for whenever the treaty calls for war, a refusal by congress to pass the necessary resolution would be a refusal by our government to keep the obligation of the treaty. The alternative would be war or a breach of the solemnly pledged faith of the United States.

"We cannot regard such a provision as necessary or useful for a league to preserve peace."

To Change Document.

"We have reached the conclusion that the true course to bring America into an effective league to preserve peace is not by insisting with Mr. Cox upon the acceptance of such a provision as article ten, thus prolonging the

unfortunate situation created by Mr. Wilson's insistence upon that article, but by frankly calling upon the other nations to agree to changes in the proposed agreement which will obviate this vital objection and other objections less the subject of dispute.

"For this course we can look only to the Republican party and its candidates; the Democratic party and Mr. Cox are bound not to follow it. The Republican party is bound by every consideration of good faith to pursue such a course until the declared object is attained.

"The conditions of Europe may make it necessary that the stabilizing effects of the treaty already made between the European powers shall not be lost by them and that the necessary changes be made by changing the terms of that treaty rather than by beginning entirely anew.

"That course Mr. Harding is willing to follow, for he said in his speech of August 28:

"I would take and combine all that is good and excise all that is bad from both organizations (the court and the league). This statement is broad enough to include the suggestion that if the league, which has hitherto riveted our considerations and apprehensions has been so entwined and interwoven into the peace of this continent, then it can be amended or revised so that we may still have a remnant of the world's aspirations in 1918, built into the world's highest conception of helpful co-operation in the ultimate realization."

"We therefore believe that we can most effectively advance the cause of international co-operation to promote peace by supporting Mr. Harding for election to the presidency."
