SAILOR HOME FROM SEA HAS MANY STORIES

Adair Lockwood Crosses Atlantic 28 Times With Warships

NOTED PORTS VISITED

Salem Man Member of George Washington's Crew When Wilson Crossed

The call of home and friends has proved more insistent than the lure of the sea with Adair Lockwood, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chauncey M. Lockwood, who returned to Salem this week, after several years of seafaring, with the Atlantic fleet during war time, and with the merchant marines afterward.

Young Lockwood has a store of interesting tales to tell, and scores of photographs taken in the principal ports of the world. His roving has taken him on 28 trips across the Atlantic. His work during war time was confined to radio operating, during his service with the merchant marine, adding to that position that of supercargo.

Belgian Royalty Democratic

In the Atlantic fleet he first shipped out on the U. S. S. Montana, later being transferred to U. S. S. George Washington, the ship that carried the presidential party across to Europe and back again, and served in like capacity for the Belgian royal party. There was a vast difference, young Lockwood explained, in the etiquette of the two parties. The presidential group came on deck for their daily promenade in the evening, a heavy body guard escorting them. No one might approach them at such times; hardly look at them. Secretary Baker was an exception. He proved very democratic, mingling freely with the boys, and allowing him to photograph him. Young Lockwood has a very good likeness of the secretary, which he had been permitted to take, "after I remove these horrid glasses," as Secretary Baker stipulated.

The royal Belgian party was the last word in Democratic friendliness. King Albert frequently doffed his official costume, replacing it with overalls, and went down into the ship's hold, shoveling coal with the men. The prince wore the uniform of a private, although he could have used the garb of an officer.

Merchant Marine Joined

Young Lockwood was discharged from the service last November. In the merchant marine service he affiliated with an American-Hawaiian ship, the Ohioan, first shipping out of Baltimore, thence to Norfolk on to Panama and Chile. The ship loaded with nitrate there, stopped at St. Thomas, Virgin Islands. The location of Bluebird's castle near which place they saw at midnight, a complete rainbow, a very rare phenomenon. They ran into bad weather off the English channel, where the French steamer "Tresbien" went down in January, 1920. They sailed up the North Sea to Amsterdam, where the young seafarer's principal activities were centered around the Rijks museum, viewing the work of the Dutch masters, Rembrandt, Van Dyke and Franz Hals. Twelve days here, then on to The Hague, through the Peace Palace and the Maurice Hulse, with its masterpieces by Rembrandt and Rubens.

Back to the states again, was the order of progress, and down to Pensacola, Fla., to take on a cargo of coal for the port of Marseilles, via Gibraltar. From there they sailed to the Azores, stopping at Ponta Fayal.

May Enter College

Another round trip was made to Pensacola, and back to the states, where young Lockwood secured a position with the United States Transport company, sailing on a new ship, "Virginia," just leaving the shipyards at Alameda, Md. Baltimore was the first stop, St. Nazaire, France, being the final objective. While in that place young Lockwood made side trips to Nantes, and the fashionable summer resort La Baule.

When the ship touched New York on its return voyage, young Lockwood severed his connection with the company and came home. Now he plans to settle down to the prosaic ways of the land, perhaps going over to O. A. C. for a year or two.
