AT THE LIBRARY

New Books.
"The Men Who Make Our Novels," by Baldwin, supplies an ever present need for more interesting information on living American novelists than is given in "Who's Who." It describes forty-seven. Such names are included as Hergesheimer, Joseph Lincoln and Peter Kraus.

Talks given in Battell Chapel at Yale and at Harvard, Princeton and other colleges by Charles Reynolds Brown, dean of the School of Religion of Yale are the contents of a thin book called "Yale Talks." Some of the talks are on "The Lure of Godliness," "Unconscious Influence," "The Power of Sentiment."

The second series of "The Treasury of War Poetry," completes the first. There is a note of devotion to high ideals lasting through the victory which is celebrated without bombast.

The author of the "Regiment of Women," Clarence Lane, has published a new novel, "Legend." The study of the growth of a tradition about a novelist after her death and its contrast to the real character of the novelist is the unusual theme.

Once in a while a book on education has the merit of stimulating thought rather than imparting information. Such a book is Bell's "Were You Ever a Child?"

Dillon's "Farmer of Roaring Run" is a romantic story of Virginia with which to while away an idle or tired hour. Down in the Midi of France there died not long ago a man who had devoted all of over 50 years to the study of the bees, ants and flies, and other insects that lived around his little country place. He wrote down what he saw in so fascinating a manner that his observations are more entrancing reading than many novels. The first of his ten books is the "Glow Worm." The name of the great naturalist is Henri Fabre.

The Commission on Inter-Church Federations of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America has published a very practical manual on Inter-Church Work.

Frey's "Sobriquets and Nicknames" will help answer such queries as "Where Did Grant Get the Name of United States Grant?" Teachers looking for exercises for spelling days will find the "Best Drill Book," by Marie Irish, helpful.

"Free Belgium," by Kellogg, gives an account of the help of the American Red Cross gave Free Belgium when it was 15 miles wide and 35 miles long.

Readers of "Little Citizens" will welcome a new old book, "Wards of Liberty" which continues Myra Kelly's studies of the east side of New York.

The "Handbook of Hydraulics" by King is a pocket size handbook of useful formulas, data, tables and diagrams for solving the problems of the hydraulic engineer.

Charles F. Lummis has added much to an appreciation of the southwest by his new book, "Who Married the Moon," is a collection of Pueblo Indian legends well illustrated of the country of the old cliff dwellers.

With a frontispiece of Crater Lake photographed by Kiser, "The Adventures of a Nature Guide," begins well and fulfills the promise of its beginning.

"Snow-Blinded on the Summit," "Winter Mountaineering," "The White Cyclone," are some of the chapter headlines. The miracle of analyzing the composition of the stars through that of light is explained clearly and simply in Newell's "Spectroscopy and Its Work."

The author of "Pacific Shores From Panama" says that "Spanish America of the Pacific still remains one of the few countries undiscovered by the tourist. Yet, viewed from this standpoint alone," he says that the trip down the coast "is a truly fascinating voyage." In a beautifully illustrated, well made book, Mr. Peixotto tells of such a journey.

Raymond's "Uncensored Celebrities" gives a pity, at times daring and ironical treatment of present-day leaders in England.

Among other poems, "Rittenhouse," "Second Book of Modern Verse" contains "Smith, of the Third Oregon, Dies."

"Autumn in Oregon—I'll never see Those hills again, a blur of blue and rain Across the old Willamette."

A copy of Thoreau's "Maine Woods" needs no introduction. Tiplady's "Social Christianity" is a militant cry of progress for Christianity.

The story of King Lear is told again in Russian fashion in Tourgenieff's "Lear of the Steppes."

William "Forbidden Trail" is a romance of Arizona. Some grand opera librettos of "Carmen," "I Pagliacci," "Cavalleria Rusticana," "Ernani" and "Rigoletto" will be of interest to music lovers.

New children's books are: Burks' "Barbara's Philippine Journey," Gask's "Babes of the Wild," Hawke's "Wood and Water Friends."

Among the magazines, Harper's for October is of special interest because of an article by Hungerford on "The Northwest." It is well illustrated. An "Old Chester Tale," by Margaret Deland, is completed in the same number.

The Touchstone magazine, which is doing much of the same work as the Craftsman did; has a special short story number for October. The Touchstone prides itself on the quality of its short stories. It has been rumored that it is almost more difficult to have a story published in it than in the Atlantic.

Appraisal Under Way for Livestock Company Lands

Manager Olson of the Pacific Livestock company and John Biggs, who were named as appraisers of the lands of the Pacific Livestock company when a compromise was effected in the litigation between the company and the state, will be in Salem today to confer with the state land board relative to a valuation of lands.

By the terms of the compromise the livestock company is paying the state \$125,000 in installments and agreed to sell certain of the lands involved so that they might be developed. It was to determine the sale value of the lands that the appraisers were named. Biggs represents the state and Olson the livestock company. Should they be unable to agree after conferring with the land board a third appraiser would be named. The Pacific Livestock case is one of the successes of George M. Brown, newly appointed justice of the supreme court, by having prosecuted the case. The original complaint against the company alleged that the lands had been obtained fraudulently by the company through the use of "dummies." After investigation another complaint was brought charging that the lands had been obtained fraudulently through forgeries and the use of fake names. The lands are situated mainly in Harney and Malheur counties.

Class Work at Y. M. C. A. Will be Under Way Today

Yesterday was the closing day of open house week at the Y. M. C. A., and now the regular classes will be held and the work of the organization will be conducted according to schedule.

Today the beginners class of boys from 8 to 10 years old will meet for gymnasium work at 9:15 a. m. and for the swimming class at 10 o'clock. The preparatory class of boys from 10 to 12 years old, will have a class at 10 o'clock and a swimming class at 11 a. m. At 2 o'clock in the afternoon, the cadet class of boys from 12 to 14 years will meet for a game period and at 3 o'clock the junior boys from 14 to 16 will meet for games. This evening commencing at 7 o'clock will be membership night of the boys' department and a general good time is anticipated. There will be swimming, pictures, etc., and all members will be expected to be present.

Horse is Too Hasty, Senator Walks With Limp

Senator McNary leaves the first of the coming week for a tour of eastern Oregon in the interests of the national Republican ticket. He has been sent out by the national committee. The senator's first address will be at Bend.

Warrant is Issued to Livestock Exposition

Sam A. Koser, secretary of state, yesterday issued a warrant for payment of \$25,000 to the Pacific International Livestock exposition company representing an appropriation of that amount by the legislature of 1919, and to be used as premiums at the annual show in Portland, beginning November 13. A bond of twice the amount is given by the secretary of the company to guarantee the faithful disbursement of the amount appropriated.

Stock Shippers Hit by Shortage of Cars

Stock shippers in eastern Oregon are suffering from car shortage, according to information reaching the public service commission. The firm of Nickson & Beck telegraphs the commission that the firm orders eight stock cars October 6 for loading cattle October 15 at Juntura.
