

JUDGE BROWN TO BE HEARD

Eleven Ballot Measures to
be Explained at Monday
Noon Luncheon

Justice George M. Brown has accepted an invitation to address the Commercial club at the Monday noon luncheon. As Justice Brown wrote the ballot title to 11 important measures to be voted on November 2, it is acknowledged that he is fully posted as to the import of each. He has agreed to take up each measure briefly at the luncheon and state just what it means. The explanations are to be entirely impartial.

Salem is deeply interested in the proposed divided session, and also the measure to extend the working days of the legislature to 60 instead of 40, as at present. The divided legislative session amendment provides for the usual 40 days' session and then an additional one of 10 days, beginning the third Monday in April. Whichever measure wins, Salem will see more of its state legislators.

Much interest has been shown in the proposed 4 per cent measure and also the proposed single tax measure. Just what these mean to the state will be explained by Justice Brown at the Monday noon luncheon at the Commercial club.

Salem is also interested in the proposed ordinance providing for a two-platoon system for the fire department and the proposed levy of \$25,000 over the amount levied for the 1920 budget.

With 11 measures, several of vital importance, to be voted on at the November election, the citizen who enters the voting booth will be handed a ballot 22 inches long and 15 inches wide.

MASS MEETING IS NEXT MOVE

Effort Launched to Forestall
Litigation in School
Controversy

Efforts to forestall litigation in the controversy between the Salem school board and the Salem Hospital association will be made at a mass meeting that has been called by A. C. Bohrnstedt, president of the Lincoln school Parent-Teacher association, for Tuesday night of this week. The meeting will be held in Leslie Methodist church.

Nearly all the patrons of the Lincoln school feel that the proposal of the hospital association that a temporary structure for school use be built on the Lincoln school grounds should not be accepted by the school board. They insist that the hospital association should relinquish the McKinley school building.

Both the school board and the members of the hospital association have been invited to attend the meeting Tuesday night; also all other persons who are interested in the question.

It is declared that if something is not done, some of the school patrons will institute injunction proceedings to oust the hospital from the school building. Mr. Bohrnstedt said that he has called the meeting in the hope that a settlement may be effected that will forestall action in the courts.

300,000 WORLD SUNDAYSCHOOLS

Marion Lawrence Outlines
Tasks and Principles
for Future

TOKIO, Oct. 6.—There are more than 300,000 Sunday schools in the world with a total enrollment of more than 33,000,000 pupils, said Marion Lawrence of Chicago, general secretary of the International Sunday School association in an address here today before the world's Sunday School convention.

The speaker declared that the Sunday school as an institution was entering upon a new phase of development due to a "divine discontent" which had settled down upon the churches. The church, he said, had come to realize that it must take the Sunday school far more seriously than in the past if it is to hold its own or make any progress.

Outlining the Sunday school of the future, Mr. Lawrence said a school that represents a church thoroughly organized for its educational tasks would embody certain principles, perhaps, as follows:

"The school will be thoroughly organized and under the direct control of the church and carried on as systematically as a bank or a department store.

"There will be in every church a committee on religious education which shall thoroughly represent all of the activities and departments of the church.

"The Bible will be the textbook of the Sunday school supplementing by such other studies as are necessary for the study of pedagogy, psychology, missions, Christian citizenship, etc.

"The preaching from the pulpit will be more expository and less hortatory than at present.

"The Sunday school will be thoroughly organized along all lines of Christian education, temperance, community service, and its keynote will be evangelism."

Mr. Lawrence said that between 2,500,000 and 3,000,000 persons were now engaged in Sunday school work as officials or teachers.

FACTS ABOUT THE CATHOLIC CHURCH

CONFESSION

Perhaps no doctrine of the Catholic church is more misunderstood by outsiders than the confession of sins. It is because of ignorance of the confessional, or the misinformation concerning it, (which amounts to the same thing). Hence we wish to go into the matter quite thoroughly, and will doubtless occupy this space for two or three weeks in explanation of this doctrine. In Mat. 1: 21 we find these words: "Thou shalt call His name Jesus, for He shall save His people from their sins." The whole history of Christ was marked by His mercy and kindness. He was continually going about doing good. He gave sight to the blind, hearing to the deaf, vitality to the withered and useless limbs. He even raised the dead to life. But in all these works of mercy, he but emphasized the fact that He came not to bring relief for physical infirmities, but for the salvation of the soul for all eternity. The manifestation of His powers by curing physical infirmities, were meant only to show His divinity. His real Godship. Indeed these physical disabilities of the body are nearly always sent to mankind in order that he may realize his dependence upon God and turn his mind toward his final end—union with God. Each of us has been taught at various times that the truest, noblest character is that in which the dross has been purified by suffering and the pure gold made to shine by the heat thus engendered. And to the reasoning mind, Christ's mission was not that of curing physical infirmities, but of saving the soul from sin. And since sin is the greatest enemy of man, it is but natural that he should institute a means by which that sin should be removed at all times and places. But how was man to obtain the forgiveness of sin after Christ had left this earth? Was he to appear in person to every sinful soul and say as He did to Magdalen, "Thy sins are forgiven thee," or did He intend to delegate this power of forgiving sins to ministers appointed for this purpose? His plan was to appoint ministers of reconciliation to act in His name. In fact it has always been the practice of God, both in the Old as well as in the New Law or Testaments, to empower human agents to execute His designs. Thus when God wished to deliver the children of Israel from bondage in Egypt, He appointed Moses as their deliverer; and in their escape from the pursuit of Pharaoh across the Red Sea it was Moses at the instigation of God who raised his hand over the waters and they were instantly divided. When they were dying from thirst in the flight, it was Moses who struck the rock from which the water flowed to quench their thirst. Our Savior did not personally restore the sight of Paul but sent Paul to His servant Ananias who restored his sight and baptized him. The same St. Paul in his epistle to the Corinthians says: (1 Cor. V. 18-20) "God hath reconciled us to Himself through Christ, and hath given to us the ministry of reconciliation." For Christ, therefore, we are ambassadors; God as if were exhorting through us. Some may say, "All this may be true, but have you the authority from the Holy Scriptures, the Bible for this forgiveness of sins? Did Christ confer upon the Apostles and their successors the power to forgive sins?" Fortunately the Bible does furnish the most positive proof, and the conferring of this power is expressed in the plainest of terms which admits of no misconception.

Buchtel Demands That Road be Thrown Open

Fred G. Buchtel, chairman of the public service commission, has addressed a pointed letter to the officials of the Willamina & Grande Ronde Railway company,

demanding that they provide an open road on the Tillamook highway, near Willamina, where the company has appropriated both the main road and a detour. At the present time traffic is cut off on the only artery of travel in that section and the farmers are suffering financially as a result.

The condition was called to the service commission's attention by the state highway commission when complaints reached the latter. The railroad company was allowed to appropriate the highway by the Polk county court on condition that it keep the road open.
