LONDON, Oct. 30 .- The Irish debate in the house of common tonight resolved itself into a duel between the opposition and the government, the former demanding and the latter resisting an independent inquiry into reprisals. Duel Debate Proceeds

The defense of the government set up by Sir Hamar Greenwood. chief secretary for Ireland, was that "while the Asquithians put several of his friends had been the emphasis on the reprisals, I

He insisted that no case had been made out for what he characterized as Arthur Henderson's demanding insulting resolution, an inquiry into the reprisals by the police and soldiers in Ireland. He incidentally remarked America was no longer welcom ing immigration from Ireland be cause it did not desire to swell the vast total of disturbing elements in the republic and he declared his intention to rake Ireland from end to end, including Ulster, in the search for arms.
