

PORTLAND GETS BEARCAT GAME

Willamette University Eleven to Play Multnomah on Latter's Grounds

Willamette Bearcats will travel north to engage in a football contest with Multnomah Saturday afternoon on the Portland field, according to an announcement made yesterday by Coach Mathews.

ing for the trip to Salem, Manager Gorman of the club team has made arrangements for the clash to be staged in Portland. This will be the first and perhaps only collegiate football game Portland will be privileged to witness this season.

Both teams have played two games each, and witnessed in action, although light, are exceedingly fast and clever. "Pruney" Francis, a former Willamette star, and Multnomah demon, declares that it will be a stiff clash and neither team will have an easy time to win.

Willamette proved its strength in the Chemawa fray last Saturday and although three men are out of the lineup on account of injuries, the aggregation has been showing up to advantage in scrimmage practice this week. Wapato has a fractured collar bone, and Captain Rarey may not be able to play on account of injuries received during the Chemawa game.

Bastler will be seen in the play again Saturday but this time he will take his position as tackle, and Harry Rarey, who has been out of the game since the first of the season with a bad ankle, will play the other tackle position.

Coach Mathews declares his team is out to get Multnomah's scalp for sure this year. Last year the Bearcats were defeated by a score of 24 to 14. This year it may be reversed.

The officials chosen for the Multnomah game are "Bill" Schmitt and Don Callierate, both Portland men, who performed the duties of umpire and head linesman at O. A. C. last Saturday.

from them there is no alternative but to submit to the majority. Same Method Discouraged The men, Mr. Acheson states, who represent the dominion home rule are of the better class, and include business and professional representatives. Their effort to solve the Irish problem in a sane, conservative way, however, has met with an official statement from the Irish republic army that their efforts must be discontinued.

The latter, inflamed and embittered, cannot see what England has done for their country's betterment, says Mr. Acheson.

Modifying the statement somewhat, Mr. Acheson believes that the present educational system is largely to blame for present national conditions. Ireland has two distinct divisions in its educational system, the Protestant and Catholic, and each is suspicious of the other. England, a short time ago, he recalled, endeavored to pass a bill taking the schools out of the hands of the church and making them a national department, but opposition was too strong.

'The educational system is very inadequate,' declares Mr. Acheson. 'Universities and higher education are looked upon with suspicion. A wide gap appears between the common school and higher institutions of learning.'

Conference May Lead to Relief in Car Shortage

Out of a conference held in Chicago October 6, attended by representatives of railroads operating in the northwest, preliminary relief from car shortage is a possible development, according to Fred G. Buchtel, chairman of the public service commission. He is informed of the conference in a letter from Clyde B. Aitchison of the interstate commerce commission, who says that the conference was called at the request of the interstate commerce commission to devise a plan for the equalization of freight equipment in interchange at Portland and other common points in the northwest. 'The movement of a reasonable supply of empty cars north through Ashland is a part of the general plan,' writes Mr. Aitchison, 'and we are convinced that this feature can and will be satisfactorily adjusted.'
