Insane Man at Hospital—Kills Himself With Razor

By cutting his throat from ear to ear with the blade of a safety razor which he had ingeniously attached to a handle, Louis Selmer, 31 years old, committed suicide at the receiving ward of the state hospital for the insane yesterday. Although a doctor was near, Selmer died within a few minutes because of the rapid flow of blood.

The patient was committed from Multnomah county September 20 last. His only relative of whom the hospital authorities have any knowledge is a sister, Frances Meden, of Cleveland, Ohio. Selmer was an Austrian.

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MORE BONDS TO GO ON MARKET

Highway Commission Announces Bids to be Opened at Next Meeting

The state highway department announced yesterday that \$1,500,000 state highway bonds will be offered for sale at the next meeting of the commission, which will be in Portland November 3. This will be the first block of the \$10,000,000 in highway bonds authorized by the special session of the legislature last January. The interest rate will be 4 1/2 per cent.

At the same meeting bids will be opened on the following construction projects:

Bridges—Jackson county—Four concrete bridges on the Agate-Trail section of the Crater Lake highway. One bridge over Rogue river on the Agate-Trail section of Crater Lake highway, two alternate proposals to be offered by bidders.

Grading and Paving—Clatsop county—Miles crossing Warrenton section of coast highway, 2.9 miles of embankment construction. Skipanon-Seaside section of Coast highway, 9.9 miles of 16-foot pavement.

Benton county—Corvallis-South section of West Side highway, eight miles of 16-foot pavement.

Jackson county—Agate-Trail section of Medford - Crater Lake highway, 14.35 miles of grading.

Malheur county—Vale - Jamieson section of John Day River highway, 17.8 miles of eight-foot gravel surfacing.

Yamhill county—Newberg - West Dayton section of West Side highway, 6.2 miles of 16-foot pavement.

A total of 503 industrial casualties were reported to the commission for the week, and out of this number 441 were subject to the application of the workmen's compensation act, 27 were from firms and corporations that have rejected the act, and 35 from utilities not subject to the act.
