First Coast Conference Game to be Played Today

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 22.—Pacific coast conference football teams get into action against each other tomorrow for the first time when Washington and the Oregon Aggies meet at Seattle.

A hard, close game is expected, as both elevens are out to take away stings of unfavorable showings of last Saturday when Washington lost to Montana, while the Aggies were doing no more than playing a scoreless tie against the Multnomah club of Portland. Three other conference teams, Oregon, Stanford and California, go outside the organization for games tomorrow, while the sixth, Washington State, does not play. Oregon, claimant of the 1919 conference championship, plays

Idaho at Eugene. Bill Steers, Oregon captain, back fieldman and star kicker, suddenly changed his plans last week and returned to play this year. An easy victory is not expected by Oregon however as the fighting Idaho players recently lost to Washington State by only 14-7. California's undefeated eleven, which has made a sensational showing this year, meets Utah at Berkeley, and Coach Andy Smith expects little trouble, as Utah was defeated last Saturday by Colorado college while the Berkeley men were overwhelming Nevada 79 to 7. Stanford plays Santa Clara in the latter's "big game."

Strike Situation Considered Hopeful

LONDON, Oct. 22.—The strike situation tonight was considered more hopeful by the fact that the peace conversations between the government and the miners' leaders are continuing unbroken. There were no new developments, however.

At a joint meeting tomorrow between the rail men and miners from which it is hoped peace may spring, it is hoped the suggestion may be made that the railmen postpone their strike set for Sunday night, should there be no agreement between the government and miners by Saturday night. The trade unions' conference on Wednesday.

The greatest anxiety exists among Londoners, for if the rail strike becomes effective Sunday night the underground tube railways will cease working. Also the trams and buses will suspend operations. The bus and tram drivers, however, have expressed themselves as reluctant to join the movement. There is division among the railroad men with regard to a strike, a large section of them opposing it. J. H. Thomas, general secretary of the national union of railwaymen, has authorized the statement that he is against the strike.

"This has brought about the very general opinion that there will not in any case be a rail strike before Wednesday, but should it transpire, the ministry of transport has an emergency plan in readiness for immediate operation of the railways by volunteers, and all machinery created for the purpose during last year's strike will be utilized."

High School Loses to Chemawa Second Squad

Salem high school football team lost to the Chemawa second team by a score of 20 to 12 at Sweetland field yesterday afternoon. The game was marked by trick plays on the part of the Indians, with several long passes chalked up to their credit.

Salem relied on straight football for the most part, and used the forward pass to advantage in several times.

The feature of the game came when Little Joe Bittle, quarterback for Chemawa, intercepted a forward pass on the two-yard line and ran the full length of the field for a touchdown.

Camp Grounds Suggested for Tree Conservation

Camp grounds along the wooded highways of the state are one of the best means of preserving the scenic beauty of Oregon roads, in the opinion of C. S. Chapman of Portland, representing the Western Forestry and Conservation association, in a letter to Governor Olcott.

Mr. Chapman is in accord with the governor's policy of preserving scenic beauty along the highways, but suggests that reasonable remuneration could be made for property desired for public purposes.

"It would be unfortunate," writes Mr. Chapman, "if public sentiment condemned to the point of interfering the legitimate removal of stumps along highways, for this would often hamper the man or the company in no position to donate any tree to the public, and in any event would do moral injustice to a property owner acting within his rights, and no doubt, too, it would to some extent hamper the growth of the industry."

State Officials Leave for Annual Inspection

State officials left here last night for Roseburg to make the regular annual inspection of the state soldier's home. The law requires that the state board of control inspect all state institutions once yearly and the secretary of the board twice yearly. R. B. Goodin, secretary of the board, has made a previous inspection of the institution this year. Besides Mr. Goodin, the officials making the trip are Sam A. Koser, secretary of state; O. P. Hoff, state treasurer; and Don H. Upjohn, private secretary to Governor Olcott, who accompanies the party as the governor's representative.

Devers Goes to Bend on Litigation for Board

J. M. Devers, attorney for the state highway commission, left Thursday night for Bend where hearing is set for Saturday on the injunction case of the Deschutes Irrigation & Reclamation company against the highway commission to stop the construction of a bridge across the company's canal unless it be of a type demanded by the company.

The type of crossing proposed by the highway commission requires a series of pipes to admit of flow of the canal water. This type has been used repeatedly in crossings over the canals of larger companies with approval of engineers. The Deschutes company, however, claims the pipes will become clogged with ice or driftwood, and demands a complete open bridge, which would cost the state several thousand dollars more than the pipe type.

Disciples of Christ Plan Welfare Work

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 22.—A comprehensive program of charitable and welfare work which includes the establishment of a home for incurable and a tuberculosis sanitarium and erection of new buildings in several cities where the denomination maintains eleemosynary institutions was endorsed at the international convention of the Disciples of Christ today.

The home for incurables will be located in Texas and the tuberculosis sanitarium either in New Mexico or Arizona, it was decided.

The institutions that are to be rebuilt are orphanages and homes for the aged at Atlanta, Cleveland, Denver, Walla Walla, Wash.; Jacksonville, Fla., and Long Beach, Cal. The convention voted \$500,000 for this work and \$200,000 for the support of these establishments the coming year.

More than two score delegates who were chaplains during the war were presented medals tonight.

TWO DISTRICTS VOTE DRY.

MELBOURNE, Australia, Oct. 22.—The voting on the question of prohibition in the state of Victoria resulted in only two districts voting dry. One hundred and thirty-two districts voted in favor of continuance of the limit license system, while 47 voted in favor of a reduction in the number of licenses.

LONDON, Oct. 22.—The Armenian premier is reported in a London Times Constantinople dispatch to have refused to submit to the ultimatum of the Russian soviet government that the Armenians repudiate the treaty with Turkey and break off diplomatic relations with the entente. This action by Armenia, it is pointed out, was taken despite the fact that the eastern frontier of the country is seriously menaced by Bolshevik forces.
