DEMOCRATS ARE PLAYED IN TALK BY W. L. TOOZE

Hard Times in Eastern Oregon Attributed to Underwood Tariff Act

1894 CRISIS RECALLED

Four Years More of Present Regime, Speaker Says, Would Cause Chaos

(The following is from the Pendleton Tribune of last Tuesday:)

Pilot Rock maintained its reputation for leading the country in turning out to political powwows last night when the little city to the south was out en masse to hear Walter L. Tooze, Sr., deliver his powerful address upon the economic aspect of the prospect of the coming election.

"Eastern Oregon is prostrate today because of the Underwood tariff law enacted by the present administration," declared Mr. Tooze. "The financial outlook for the immediate future never looked worse; cattle and sheep men in eastern Oregon are broke and the banks are unable to loan a cent to the needy farmers, whom they have been forced to carry too long, now. All because of the free trade tendency of the Underwood tariff, the evil effects of which could not be noticed during the war because exports for troops were great and because no shipments from foreign countries could be made."

Mr. Tooze drew the parallel between the present situation and the crisis of 1894, which was brought about by the Wilson tariff law, also a Democratic perpetration. He said: "More than five hundred millions more imports were received into this country during the first eight months of 1920 than ever in the same period last year and exports dropped off more than \$800,000,000 in the same time. Trade is being suffocated; congestion is becoming acute, and the end is not in sight. Year after year more of the present regime and industries would shut down, business would be paralyzed and millions of men thrown out of work."

There is only one actual remedy and that is the election of Warren G. Harding to the presidency and the election of a Republican senate. The real issue in Oregon, perhaps more than other states, is the tariff; not the league of nations. Industries must have protection and the only reason the Democrats are crying that the league of nations is the paramount issue in this campaign is because they think it is their only salvation, that they may be able to get away with it like they did with 'He kept us out of war' four years ago.

G. O. P. Victory Certain: That Harding and Coolidge will carry Oregon by from 50,000 to 100,000 majority is the confident prediction of Mr. Tooze. The speaker places Stanfield's probable majority at from 10,000 to 20,000 and stated that his stock is increasing every day that the campaign progresses. The tendency, he continued, is to swat the Democratic administration out of control for punishment for their blunders of omission and commission.

Chamberlain never did a thing for Oregon during his 12 years at Washington, D. C., declared Mr. Tooze. "He was there six years during the time when the Democrats were in full control, yet he asks a normally Republican state by more than 140,000 to send him back again; George E. Chamberlain will not be elected this year; for the first time he faces a united Republican party and the shoe is on the other foot, his party is divided. The state's vote may mean the difference between a Republican and Democratic congress, and the magnitude of that difference is going to make the Republicans arise to the crisis and send Robert S. Stanfield back to work with Senator McNary next term. If Stanfield is elected, McNary will retain his chairmanship of the powerful irrigation committee, which means so much to Oregon, and few people realize perhaps, that Sinnott's Oregon district is larger than the entire state of Pennsylvania."

Stanfield Election Urged: Mr. Tooze is an able public speaker. He is an experienced public figure and his words carry the conviction of a man, who knows what he is talking about. He was extremely well received by the large Pilot Rock audience. R. Cloupek and Marion Jack were in the party which accompanied the speaker to the nearby city. His itinerary has thus far included Vale, Nyssa, Ontario, Baker, La Grande and Enterprise. At Baker he spoke with Montaville Flowers, and at Enterprise with N. J. Sinnott. Mr. Tooze received a telegram from his son, Capt. Walter L. Tooze, Jr., just prior to the meeting, which read as follows: "Stanfield Election Urged: The election of a Republican senator from Oregon is vital. Harding will be elected by a tremendous landslide. It is disastrous to governmental efficiency that these crucial days of reconstruction not to have a harmonious senate. Oregon Republicans must elect Stanfield, otherwise they are voting control of five committees of congress to southern Democracy. Best interests of America demand a Republican senate. Principles, not personalities must govern. Republican national leaders are all looking to Oregon for a gain in the senate including Harding." Captain Tooze is a special representative of the National Republican headquarters, with offices at Chicago. He is well known in Oregon, having practiced law in Dallas and McMinville.
