history, nor shall I criticize the big interests which have furnished millions to disseminate such lies, for instance, as the one about Governor Cox's attitude toward the traveling men. I will simply state what will soon be a proved fact that the country is to be saved from the disaster of the election of Senator Harding at the hands of profiteers, pro-Germans, little Americans and blinded partisans."

Mr. Marsh said the number of individual contributions received today was the largest of any day since the campaign opened. Upwards of 9000 contributions reached headquarters, including \$3000 to the "match the president" fund.

him in the semi-darkness of the theater.

During the demonstration of greeting, Mrs. Cox was escorted down to the center aisle, and to the speaker's stand. The governor took her by the hand and the applause was given a fresh spurt. From the balconies spectators rained a shower of scrap paper.

The demonstration continued 10 minutes.

League Plead For Turning immediately to the league issue, Governor Cox pleaded that the "peace won by our soldier boys be not destroyed by a senatorial cabal."

There was prolonged applause when the governor declared president Wilson was "as much a

wounded soldier as any soldier." He said the president presented the "saddest picture in all the history of the world."

During recital by the speaker of the league's genesis and its "submission" for suggestions to former President Taft and Elihu Root, there were many hisses from many quarters for the names of the two Republicans.

Lodge Is Hissed The name of Senator Lodge also was hissed loudly and "booed" when the governor reiterated his charge of conspiracy. Similar demonstrations were given when the governor named other Republican senators signing the "round robin" and predicted their defeat. The governor interpolated a prediction that Senator Newberry of Michigan would be "returned to Michigan or some other safe place." The crowd shouted when the governor said he believed Senator Harding "would be left at home."

Repeated demonstrations were given the candidate's views on the Irish question. A man asked how the governor could present the Irish cause to the league, when the questioner said, it was called a domestic question. The crowd cheered when the governor replied a question could not be considered domestic when "it shocked the conscience of the world—a war of extermination that has become a tragedy."

The governor's ridicule and criticism of Senator Harding's league pronouncements brought laughter and applause.

A man broke into the governor's league argument with the question:

"If elected, would you release Eugene Debs?"

"Boos" and cries of "no, no," and "yes, yes," delayed the reply. The governor reiterated that he favored immediate repeal of war laws curtailing freedom of

The heights and weights of the children examined are to be compared with these average heights and weights. No heights and weights are given for the separate months after 48 months. With a child over 4 years of age, use the age at his last birthday.

Preparations Complete for Enlisting New Members for Salem Y. M. C. A.
