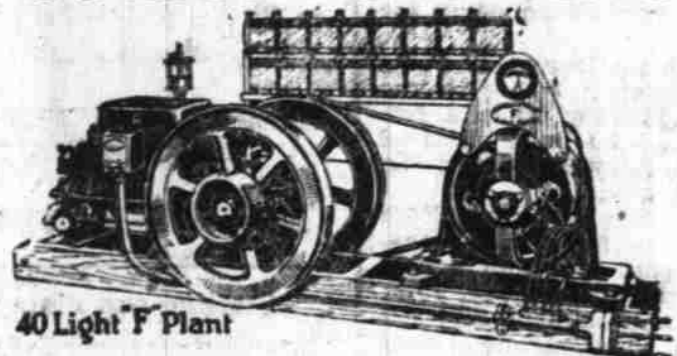

Funeral services will be held at the Presbyterian church at Turner, Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock. Interment will be in the Masonic Twin Oak cemetery.

Linotype Composition Record Is Claimed

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Oct. 25.—Alder Hewitt, linotype operator on the Tribune, on Sunday night established what is said to be the world's record for linotype composition, setting 82,500 ems in six hours and 35 minutes, an average of 12,500 ems an hour. Hewitt's setting was entirely in nonpareil. The setting was in straight away composition and not in competition.

Irish Sympathizers Attend Mass Meetings

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—Thousands of Irish sympathizers attended mass meetings tonight, protesting against what they termed the "murder by the imperialistic government of Great Britain" of Lord Mayor Terence MacSwiney. Dudley Field Malone, farmer-labor party candidate for governor of New York, Walter E. Holloway of Philadelphia, and several Irish women, speaking to a great crowd in Columbus circle, criticized the government at Washington and the Republican and Democratic national candidates "for refusal to intervene in the cause of Ireland."

Flags of the Irish republic and of America and buttons bearing the photograph of Mayor MacSwiney were distributed in the crowd, which booed and hissed every mention of the British government and Premier Lloyd George, while references to MacSwiney as "one of the greatest martyrs in history" and to the "Irish republic" were greeted with prolonged applause.

A young man in the crowd who said he was an Englishman, belittled remarks by one speaker and was severely beaten before he was rescued by policemen.

Chief Witness in Denton Cases Did Not Disappear

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 25.—Mrs. R. C. Peete, regarded as an important witness in the county grand jury inquiry into the Jacob Charles Denton murder mystery, who failed today to appear before the investigators in response to a subpoena has not disappeared and will not disappear, according to a statement tonight by her attorney, Biarne Casburg.

Mrs. Peete passed the day shopping in Los Angeles, Mr. Casburg said, and was expected to return early tonight to the hotel in La Crescenta, near here, where she and her husband and their daughter have stayed since she returned here from Denver, Colo., to aid in the murder investigation.

O. A. C. Fullback Is Out of Game

CORVALLIS, Or., Oct. 25.—George Powell, fullback on the Oregon Agricultural college football team, will be out of the game for the remainder of the season, according to positive announcement tonight by James J. Richardson, college director of athletes, following a surgeon's examination of an injury sustained by Powell in last Saturday's game at Seattle. A tendon in the player's knee joint was shown to

be ruptured, it was said. Quarterback McKenna of the Aggie team, also was badly hurt in Saturday's game, but hope was expressed that he would be sufficiently recovered by the end of the week to participate in the game against California.

Stayton Cheers Wildly at Stanfield's Name

A rousing Republican rally was held at Stayton last night, where a crowd that filled the city hall cheered wildly every time the speakers mentioned the name of Robert N. Stanfield, Republican candidate for United States senator.

The speakers were Congressman Hawley and Judge P. H. D'Arcy, who, with Senator A. M. LaFollett and W. M. Cherrington, were taken to Stayton by Ralph Thompson, chairman of the county Republican central committee.

Wilson Seeks Support of Young College Men

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—President Wilson telegraphed the Young Americans' Democratic league of Columbia university today his belief that the young men and women "will rally to the support of the perpetuation of the high ideals for which we fought in the war."

THREE CONVICTS ESCAPE.

WALLA, WALLA, Wash., Oct. 25.—Three convicts escaped from the state penitentiary this afternoon. They slipped away while picking apples in a nearby orchard and prison bloodhounds lost track after tracking them about a mile. The men are Earl Baxter, arson second degree; Tom McFarland, grand larceny; and Ora Sanford, grand larceny.

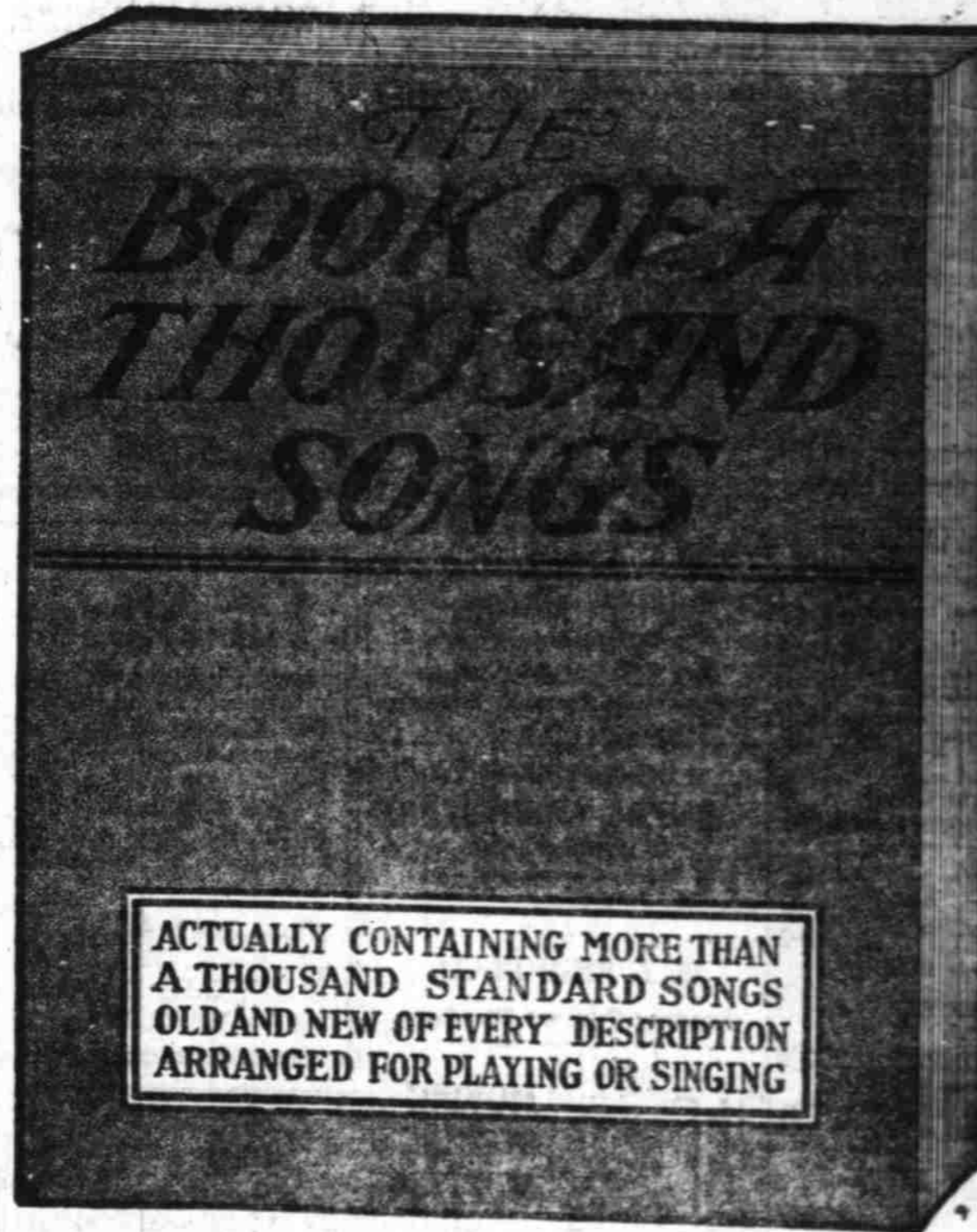
