Sheriff Springer stopped him by puncturing one of the rear tires of Converse's automobile with a shotgun. The girl was with Converse at the time and it is said they were trying to cross the state line.

Several recent incidents where stores and dwellings have been entered have given satisfactory evidence that the intruders are minors. State and Government May Agree on Scheme

Formulation of a working plan for co-operation between the state and the government under the vocational aid act is the primary object of a conference that will be held between the federal board for vocational education and representatives of state workmen's compensation boards in Salt Lake City, November 8 to 10 inclusive. Will T. Kirk, member of the state industrial accident commission, and Frank H. Shepherd of Oregon Agricultural college, state director of vocational education, will attend the conference. Under the vocational education act Oregon is entitled to \$5000 for the first year of operation, the money to be matched dollar for dollar by the state. The federal money, however, may be applied to any workman regardless of whether he is with an employer who is under the state compensation act. The state fund applies to workmen who are under that act. This makes necessary the working agreement that probably will be reached at the Salt Lake conference.

School Funds, Apportioned by County Superintendent

The apportionment of the county and state school fund for Marion county is being made at the office of the county superintendent of schools and will be ready in ample time for the issuance of the warrants on the date set, which is November 8. The law requires the school district clerks to give a bond varying according to the amount of money credited to the districts, and which must be filed with the county superintendent prior to the date of the issuance of the warrant. Money will be sent to all districts where the clerks have bonds filed on November 8.

Local Questions up at Hearing at State House

Two hearings were conducted by the public service commission in Salem yesterday. One was on application of patrons of the Oregon Electric railroad for better station facilities at Talbot, Marion county, where heavy shipments of pulp wood, excelsior wood and cord wood are made, and the other was relative to an application by the Marion county court for establishment of a grade crossing at Claxton station.

Asher is Charged With Theft of Turner Trunk

Albert Asher was brought from Portland yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Smith. He is wanted on a charge of being implicated in the stealing of a trunk from the Baker hotel in Turner last March. A young man, nephew of Asher, who was with him at the time of the theft, pleaded guilty to the charged during the last term of court, and was given one year in the penitentiary on parole. At the time of the trial Asher was serving a 90-day sentence in the Multnomah county jail for stealing an automobile in Portland. Yesterday, which was the day set for his release, the Marion county official was on hand and took him in hand. He is now awaiting trial in the Marion county jail.

C. M. Idleman Addresses Republicans at Silverton

There was a big Republican rally at Silverton last night. Hon. C. M. Idleman, formerly attorney general, was the speaker. He had an audience that packed the opera house to the doors. Mr. Idleman said he was glad to be greeted by such a fine audience, because it was the first time he had been back to make a speech since he was there in 1896 for McKinley—24 years ago. Oscar Steelhammer, an old time member of the Silverton band, was there to help his comrades of former days make the right kind of Republican music.

Irrigation Controversy is Aired at Conference

A controversy between irrigation interests using water from Bear creek, Jackson county, was aired at a meeting of the state water board yesterday, in which extension of time was asked on two permits from the water board authorizing the use of water from the stream. On one side is the Rogue River Valley Canal company and the Medford Irrigation district and on the other the Talent Irrigation district. Each side contests the right of the other to have an extension. On a stipulation setting out the dates when the permits were granted and development work that has been done under them the board will base its decision which probably will be announced at the next meeting of the water board.

Car Shortage is Being Reduced

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—Marked reduction in the freight car shortage is shown in reports issued tonight by the American Railway association. For the week ending October 8, the average daily shortage of cars as compared with orders placed by shippers was placed at 75,336, compared with 80,141 the previous week. Interstate commerce commission officials predicted a further easing in the car shortage as a result of the cancellation of the northwest coal preference order and because the low price of wheat was holding back shipments.
