cratic party be retired from the administration of the government of the United States and shall the Republican party be entrusted with the administration of that government."

He maintained there was not necessarily any disgrace connect-

ed with the failure of the administration to retain the confidence of a great, democratic people, but held that when this occurred there should be a change from one party to the other, adding: "This condition appears to have arrived in America."

World Needed a Newton.

The governor criticized the failure of the administration to take advantage of post-war conditions to capitalize on our mer-

chant marine and declared one of the first undertakings of the Republicans would be "to salvage what they can out of the colossal loss that has been suffered through inefficiency of the Democratic shipping board."

To illustrate a point connected with the discussion of President Wilson's foreign policy, Governor Coolidge told a story of the Greek philosopher, Thales, who, when wandering in the fields looking at the stars, fell into a pit. A peasant woman passing by was asked to pull him out, and, woman-like, she asked how he had fallen there. He said he was examining the stars. With a woman's wit, she replied: "Foolish man, how canst thou expect to know the stars if thou dost not know what lies at thy feet?"

Many centuries passed and another philosopher, watching the fall of an apple, tried to understand the thing that had happened at his feet and discovered the law which governed the stars. "The world has needed an Isaac Newton and it has had a Thales."

LABOR PAPER IS LAUNCHED

L. V. McAdoo Announces
That He Will Publish Labor Leader in Salem

It is authoritatively announced that beginning with its issue of November 12, Salem will have another newspaper in the field, and its name will be The Labor Leader. Recently L. V. McAdoo, a member of the local Typographical union, appeared before the Central Trade and Labor council and asked permission to establish a labor paper in Salem and the request was immediately and unanimously granted, the members expressing themselves as very anxious to have a spokesman for the activities of the various labor organizations now in the city.

This field has heretofore been uncovered, and there no doubt is plenty of room for such a paper, and no doubt it will be liberally patronized by the merchants of the city. Mr. McAdoo is well and favorably known by many of the business men, having been a resident of Salem since 1911. For a number of years he was employed on the Statesman, later going into business for himself at Sherwood, in Washington county. He has been at Bend for the past 17 months, and while there was editor and manager of the labor paper, making a success of it.

While Mr. McAdoo has the solid backing of the central council he also has secured the right to solicit business from the merchants by asking permission of the president of the Business Men's league, and is therefore launching his undertaking in a legitimate manner and under authority. Wishes for the utmost success of the new undertaking are extended.

Mr. McAdoo says his paper will be issued weekly, Friday being the publication day.

You will show all proper respect by appearing in the reviewing stand. The country cannot afford to lose its president."

"His reply was: 'The country cannot afford to have a coward for president.' This was his brief and final answer. He rode in the procession."

Pictured Before War.

Two final pictures, Mr. Tumulty said, he desired to draw, the first, that of the president in 1917, "a straight, vigorous, slender man, active and alert."

"He is 60 years of age," he said, "but looks not more than 45, so lithe of limb, so alert of bearing, so virile; that is Woodrow Wilson reading his great war message."

The other picture is only three and a half years later. There is a parade of veterans of the great war. They are to be reviewed by the president on the east terrace of the White House. In a chair sits a man, your president, broken in health, but still alert in mind; his hair is white, his shoulders bowed, his figure bent. He is 63 years old, but he looks older. It is Woodrow Wilson.

Wounded By Great War.

"Presently in the procession there appears an ambulance laden with wounded soldiers, the maimed and blind. As they pass, they salute, slowly, reverently."

"The president's right hand goes up in answering salute. I glance at him, there were tears in his eyes. The wounded greet the wounded; those in the ambulance, he in the chair, are alike casualties of the great war."

"I don't believe in his heart President Wilson regrets his wounds. I fancy he realizes no man could die in a greater cause but I do sometimes wonder if it ever seems to him stranger that when a man has been seriously wounded in his country's service that he should be met with sneers and calumnies from his countrymen."

MOORE TESTS SALEM BABIES

Portland Child Specialist
Instructs Mothers on
Care and Diet

Standing in the center of a group of troubled mothers in the Commercial club auditorium yesterday, Dr. C. U. Moore, eminent child specialist of Portland, aroused a pure memory of the Great Physician, surrounded in a similar way many, many years ago. Yesterday's occasion was the regular monthly clinic of the Marion County Children's bureau, Dr. Moore's presence being in response to a united invitation on the part of officials of the organization.

Local doctors and nurses assisting were Dr. C. E. Downs, Dr. E. E. Fisher, Dr. J. H. Garbajet, Miss Lillian Godsey, Miss Grace Taylor and Miss Nina Cook.

And if the bureau accomplished nothing greater than was consummated yesterday, its efforts have not been in vain, for Dr. Moore's examination showed that a good proportion of the babies examined were suffering from ailments peculiar to childhood. After a careful physical inspection of each child, mothers were instructed in detail just the right schedule to follow in the matter of diet and general care, and so that these rules would not be forgotten, the nurses were instructed to take copies of them as Mr. Moore gave them out, which later were given to the mothers.

Dr. Moore's strong point is breast feeding, and this point he emphasized yesterday, making the rather strong statement, "There is absolutely no reason for the discontinuance of breast feeding, under nine months, aside

from the death of the mother or the presence of tuberculosis."

About 25 children were examined, many of them coming from a distance.

Portland Suburbs May Get Better Service

Better telephone service for residents of the Arleta and Lents districts near Portland will result when the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company complies with a letter written by Fred G. Buchtel, chairman of the public service commission, to C. E. Hickman, manager of the company at Portland.

The commission, after investigation, directs your attention to the urgent necessity of completing and placing in service the Arleta automatic telephone exchange which has been under construction for some time and intended more adequately to serve the Arleta and Lents districts," writes Mr. Buchtel.

"We are mindful of the construction difficulties encountered, nevertheless the prompt 'cut over' of this exchange will relieve both the Tabor and the Sellwood districts and not only materially improve the service afforded in these territories, but otherwise relieve the general situation."

"Consequently we shall expect every effort to be put forth to complete and place in service the exchange referred to."

DEBATE CHANCE IS EXCELLENT

Victory for Salem High
Means Permanent Possession of Trophy Cup

Prospects of Salem high school capturing the state championship in debate this year seems exceedingly good, according to prevalent opinion expressed by the "cup chasers" of the local school.

With two of last year's letter men, Ralph Bailey and Percy Hammond back, and with the splendid material in the school, Salem's chances are exceptionally good, according to Coach Savage.

The question for debate this year in this district is, "Resolved, That the Direct Primary Law of Oregon Should be Repealed."

The question for the state debate is the question of government ownership of railroads.

The announcement of these questions has caused much satisfaction on the part of those interested. Both questions are broad and considered excellent subjects.

The contest for the state championship is conducted each year by the University of Oregon. The winning team, from each of the districts meets at Eugene and in a series of triangular preliminaries determines the three state leaders. These three contest for state supremacy on a final triangular debate. The champion is awarded a silver cup which remains in possession of the winning school until such time as the team shall meet de-

feat. Any high school that retains the cup for three years is so far Salem is the only school that has held the cup for three years. Success this year, therefore, means that the cup will permanently adorn the trophy.

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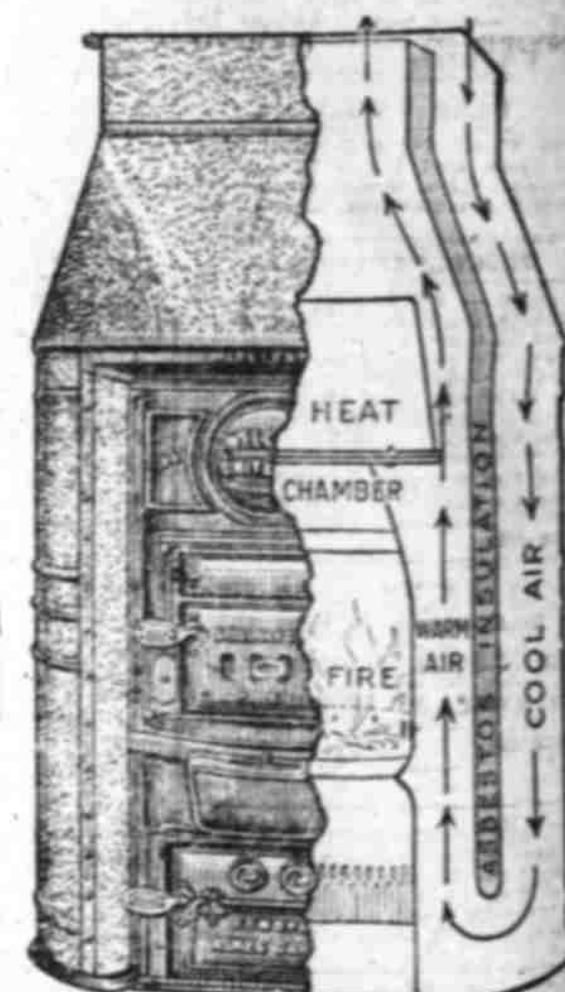
