INASMUCH as they feel that good will toward mankind and generous giving to those in need, should not be linked with the calendar, and believing that all other Salem women assume the same attitude, members of the Salem chapter of American War Mothers are asking the housewives of the city to contribute to the brief campaign that they are backing for jams and jellies, for the tubercular soldiers, at the government hospital in Fort Bayard, N. M.

All contributions must be sent to the Armory by Friday, and as the time is so short, it is urged that those in a position to assist in this splendid effort, do so at once. One may give as much as one likes—one jar or a dozen. The American Legion is to do the packing, and the government will defray expenses of shipping.

Over one thousand men are being cared for at the New Mexico hospital, and it is expected that by Christmas this number will be greatly increased.

Miss Cornelia Marvin state librarian, who conceived the idea of sending this gift from Oregon during her personal visit to the institution, as a part of her war work when she established a hospital library for the men, is co-operating with the War Mothers, who immediately took up the work at her suggestion and are bending every effort to make the campaign successful.

"The idea is not that the men are underfed," quoting Miss Marvin, "but that they are in a foreign place, where nothing grows; in a sick and forlorn condition, hundreds of miles from home and friends—isolated from the world. A generous gift, especially from the women of Oregon, in the name of the War Mothers, will come as a splendid testimonial that sympathy and good will is not dead, and will help greatly in reviving spirits, that are at best too forlorn."

The commanding officer at the hospital is vitally interested in the effort, and so also is the librarian, to whom will be sent direct, the shipment from Salem, and to whom will fall the pleasant privilege of seeing that each man shares in the distribution of good things.

Anyone unable to deliver their contributions to the Armory, may phone Mrs. John A. Carson, president of the local chapter of War Mothers, and she will see that they are collected. Anyone may send as much as one likes, but in every instance, the caps should be securely fastened to the jars.

What promises to be the red letter event on this week's social miscellany, is the large dancing and card party which Mr. and Mrs. Z. J. Riggs will give Thursday night at Dreamland, which, although informal, promises to be a most attractively-planned affair. C. B.
