At 5 p. m. evening dinner will be served. Coffee will be served free.

Music for the day will be furnished by the combined Silverton and Mt. Angel bands.

HARDING IS
SERENADED

a supporter of Mr. Harding through the campaign is president of the civic association and acted as the spokesman of the serenaders.

The dozen girl stenographers and clerks attached to Harding headquarters headed the parade which formed in the business section and marched to the Harding residence along the pathway of the front porch delegations of the campaign. The Harding marching club, the Harding women's club of Marion, women employees of the Marion Steam Shovel company, the Harding railway club and many other organizations of this and other cities were in the line.

Parade Reviewed From Porch
President-elect and Mrs. Harding first reviewed the parade as it passed the front porch and then greeted the marchers as they broke ranks and assembled on the lawn. Then both expressed particular pleasure at the work of the civic association, which despite the fact that its officials include members of both parties, has busied itself during the summer extending courtesies to those called here by the front porch campaign.

With virtually no appointments, Mr. Harding devoted today to cleaning up his affairs here in preparation for his vacation trip. He pushed through a mass of correspondence and replied to many telegrams of congratulations.

Vacation Trip Planned.
Detailed arrangements for the vacation trip, announced today, show that those who will go along with the president-elect and his wife, include Senators Frelinghuysen of New Jersey, Hale of Maine, Elkins of West Virginia, Edward B. McLean, the Washington publisher; Harry M. Daugherty, the Harding pre-convention manager; G. B. Christian, Jr., Mr. Harding's secretary; Dr. C. E. Sawyer, his family physician; Judson C. Weddover, publicity director of Harding headquarters, and Valcomb Jennings, attached to the headquarters. The wives of several of these will accompany them and two stenographers, a secret service guard and a dozen newspapermen will complete the party.

The trip will be made on a special train which will leave here Saturday morning and will go to Point Isabel, Texas, by way of St. Louis and San Antonio.

Korean Independence
Seems Impossible

TOKIO, Nov. 3.—Because it appears to be out of the question for Koreans to expect that their country will be granted its independence, the Koreans are obliged to appeal to the Imperial family of the Japanese Empire, was one of the statements in an anonymous letter received by Prince Fushimi.

The letter contained threats as to what would happen if the hopes of the writer were not fulfilled.

The authorities have arrested one man on suspicion. The letter said that the "appeal" was sent by the Korean independence organization.
