BETTER SPEECH

"Our national use of vocal sound in men and women is slowly, an absolutely ineffectual dabbling of unapplied tone. I commend to you imitation of formed and finished utterances wherever that music steals upon your ear. The more you listen to it the more you will live it, the more you will wonder that you could have ever lived without it."

Everybody who prays for a better America—whether in school or out, whether a professional man, a shop girl, or a mother of a family—should co-operate to raise the standard and improve the quality of our speech. Individually we can do much; co-operatively, we can do much more. If we have improvement clubs for real estate, why not have improvement clubs for our speech?

1. Correct pronunciation: (a) Mistakes due to ignorance: Romance (accent on the second syllable), address (accent on the second syllable), bouquet (first syllable "boo"), sword (the "w" is silent).

(b) Mistakes due to carelessness: Recognize, (not recognize; sound the "g"), usual (three syllables), forget (not forgit), eleven (three syllables).

2. Clear Enunciation—Can you pronounce these pairs of words so that your educated auditors can invariably know which words you mean? Sense, cents; tense, tents; patience, patients.

3. Grammar: That kind (not those kind) those kinds; these sort (not these sort), these sorts; these data; this datum; these memoranda; the memorandum; those phenomena; that phenomenon.

4. Good diction—Of the 50 things that you "fix," about 49 you have really mended, repaired, arranged, put in order. Try the words "mend" and "repair." You will be immediately pleased with the definite meaning they convey.

"Our aim is clear, correct and pleasant speech in everyday life for the sake of those to whom we speak."

Every utterance really concerns two or more persons, for its aim is social. Remember the other person. Speaking is a double-ended process. "It springs from me, it penetrates him," says Professor Palmer; "and both of these ends needs watching. Hither-sketter" and "forth" our unaimed words, merely for our personal relief, heedless whether they help or hinder him whom they still purport to address? Do not become absorbed in yourself.

Suggestions For End of Week. 1. Correct pronunciation—We should be able to distinguish between long "u" (use, unit, fusion, pure, cube, human) and the "u" after "r" (rude, rumor, rural). Let us take "use" and "rude." Types: Pronounce the vowel in the following like the "u" in "use": introduce, produce, avenue, news, due, blue, dew, duty. Tune, numerous, assume. Pronounce the following like "rude": True, try, cruel, fruit, crude, general. Practice this combination "true-blue" (true like "rude," blue like "use.")

2. Clear enunciation—First syllables should not be slurred. Pronounce: Because, not b'cus nor buh-cause. De-Bats, not d'bate nor dub-bate.

Pos-seas not possess. En-gage, not inage. Po-lice, not p'lice. Es-teem, not is-teem. Dis-tinguish between—De-spair and de-spot. De-spise and de-spatch. 2. Clean cut sentence structure—Read this quotation and try to realize the lost opportunity in the repeated use of "and": "The second speaker had sat quietly waiting and he was a man of a different type, and he began calmly, and from the very first words he showed great earnestness."

4. Grammar. Each, every, every one, everybody, anybody, either, neither, no one, nobody, and similar words are singular.

Wrong: Everybody did their best. Right: Everybody did his best. Wrong: Each of my three friends were there. Right: Each of my three friends was there.

5. Good diction—"Every seed, every animal, has its use; so has every word in the English language."

Do you overwork the word "proposition"? May you not mean neither, "transaction," "understanding," "suggestion," "difficulty," "proposal"? Do you overwork the word "said"? There are 50 other words that better express your meaning. Some of them are: Declared, insisted, exclaimed, added, repeated, replied, admitted, commented, corrected, protested, explained, inquired.

Olcott Wants Westerner for Interior Department

Governor Olcott yesterday sent a letter to Warren G. Harding, president-elect of the United States, urging that he appoint a western man as secretary of the interior in his cabinet. The governor said he had no special man in mind.

"Perhaps you will remember," writes the governor, "a movement of this kind was started before the election. At that time I was very seriously opposed to burdening you with such a request, as I deemed it improper that you should be called upon prior to the election to make promises of appointment to any person or to any section of the country, but with you standing as president-elect, following your magnificent triumph in both the east and the west, I consider it perfectly proper to address you on the subject at this time."
