EVERY TOWN IN COUNTY READY FOR ROLL CALL

Chairman McDaniel Reports Manager Appointed and Workers Instructed

Red Cross Representatives to Visit All Residents in Jurisdiction

Plans for the fourth annual Red Cross roll call are practically completed, according to a report issued by the local chapter yesterday. The organization of Polk and Marion counties has been actively carried on during this last five days. Every town in the two counties is ready for the opening of the roll call. Managers have been appointed in each district and a trained corps of workers instructed in their duties.

"The people throughout the two counties who really know what the Red Cross is doing are not only ready, but are anxious to co-operate in making the roll call a success," said Chairman B. W. McDaniel. "The influence of the Red Cross has been felt in every portion of Willamette chapter. We are receiving phone calls from practically every district relative to the securing of a corps of assistants. Some people who have been active have refused to assist because of their inability to place the greatness of the cause above local and petty jealousies. I am happy to report, however, that this condition has been met infrequently and that the residents of Polk and Marion counties are practically working as a unit this year."

Board Breaks Record.
The office of the Board of control broke all records when it notified the chapter last night that it not only had organized to aid the cause but that every member in the bureau had renewed the membership and only awaited the visit of the chapter representative to turn over the proceeds.

Similar results are coming in from all districts, according to Chairman McDaniel.

A feature of the publicity connected with the roll call which is certain to attract widespread at-

tention is a special exhibit of war photographs to be displayed in two of the local store windows. The photographs are authentic and represent varied phases of the world war. The work of the Red Cross at the front is especially well portrayed. The collection of pictures was made by Perry Prescoe through the aid of the newspaper man, who spent two years overseas in the photography section of the army. The collection has never before been made public and it is through his courtesy that the Red Cross was given the privilege of using the pictures in conjunction with the roll call.

According to present arrangements, every resident of Marion and Polk counties will be visited personally by a representative of Willamette chapter before the completion of the roll call," said Mr. McDaniel. "We are especially anxious to have it known that the roll call is not a drive or a campaign. The Red Cross is operating on a peace basis and will make an annual appeal to the public through its roll call. The roll call is simply a renewal of memberships."

State Institutions Eager.
"Under the organization this year, practically every state institution and large plant is handling its own renewals. It was thought more expedient to have these larger institutions carry on their own work, as the sending in of outside solicitors interrupts the routine of the offices."

The active solicitation will begin on Armistice day and close on Thanksgiving day. Every chairman of every school district, as well as every rural school teacher, has been made an active worker this year. On Armistice day it is planned to have Red Cross talks in practically all school districts.
