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W. S. C. LOSES
TO CALIFORNIAStanford and Whitman Are
Victors in Close Contests

BERKELEY, Cal., Nov. 6.—University of California's undefeated football team here today, by a 49-0 score, added the Washington State college to the long list of western eleven defeated this year by overwhelming scores, on California field.

Washington State college had come down from the north reputed one of the best teams in Oregon and Washington. The game was to be California's first real test. But the heavy blue and gold line and fast backfield stood the test. They broke up the invaders' line smashes, blocked the aerial attack, outkicked them and sent touchdown after touchdown over the northern goal.

Victories today of Stanford university at Seattle and California here put the two California schools in the lead in the Pacific coast conference race. The organization's 1920 championship will go to the winner of the "big game" here November 29 between Stanford and California. Washington state today found holes in the California line and circled the California ends, but not when the

line and gold was in danger. In the first period Washington state threatened when Gillis, by an edge run, took the ball to California's 10-yard line. But California stiffened and held. In the last period forward passes gave Washington state the ball again close to the California line, but the Berkeley men again held.

Sax, Washington state quarterback, played a big portion of the game for the northerners. With Gillis, the visitors' fullback, he did most of the offensive work. The entire California backfield figured in the plays that counted.

Stanfield 3—Washington 0

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 6.—Stanford university scored a 3 to 0 victory over the University of Washington football eleven here today, practically eliminating the Purple and Gold as a contender for the coast conference championship. Stanford's only score came one minute after the whistle blew at the start of the second quarter. Templeton, Cardinal kicking ace, placing a drop kick between the posts of the 20-yard line.

Washington started the game with a rush, getting the ball in purple and gold territory and carrying it by a series of line smashes and end plays to the Stanford 30-yard line. There the southerners stiffened their resistance and Wilson tried a drop kick from the field. The ball went wide, and after Templeton had punted out of danger, the Stanford goal was never again seriously menaced.

After the one Washington offensive, it became apparent that neither side could gain appreciably through the line and the game resolved itself into a kicking contest between Templeton and Wilson. The Cardinal halfback, arching his punts high into the air for gains of 40 to 50 yards had the advantage, the ball being played in Washington territory most of the time in the final periods.

Twice after he had scored the winning points of the game, Templeton tried for drop kicks, one from the center of the field and once from the 30-yard line, but both attempts failed. In the second period, Schlaudeman broke away for beautiful 40-yard run through a broken field but Wilson's tackle brought him down, and Eckmann, interception of a forward pass on the next play carried the ball out of danger.

Patrick, Stanford fullback, several times was able to gain through the line but in every case the Washington forwards finally held and forced the southerners to kick.

Whitman 13—Montana 7

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Nov. 6.—Whitman College defeated the University of Montana football team here today 13 to 7 after breaking up Montana's famous Minnesota shift time after time. Tilton, Whitman halfback made both Whitman scores on crisp cross plays when the Missionaries were within 12 yards of the goal. The second attempt at goal failed. Montana's score was made in the third quarter on an end run, Sullivan scoring and kicking goal.

Whitman made one attempt at field goal but failed. The Whitman team showed a big improvement over last Saturday when it lost to Idaho 21 to 7.

Gonzaga, 20; Multnomah 0.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 6.—Gonzaga university of Spokane, Wash., defeated Multnomah club of Portland at football today, 21 to 0. The game was replete with fast plays, mainly by the visitors.

Nebraska, 0; Penn State, 20.

STATE COLLEGE, Pa., Nov. 6.—The fast and heavy University of Nebraska eleven lost claim to eastern football honors here today when Penn State college defeated the western team 20 to 0.
