SOCIAL life the past week was almost entirely overshadowed by politics, nearly every activity in society being of secondary importance. The Capital city's foremost assistants had been at work, and evidence of their skill was noted in every particular. The seemingly uncompromising interior of the auditorium was transformed with a clever arrangement of cedar garlands that formed a canopy above the dancers, entwined the supporting columns and festooned the improvised orchestra booth. Tall standards of pom pom chrysanthemums, grouping of palms, and a border about the entire room of tall branches of vari-hued autumn foliage gave a suggestion of an October woodland that was attractive in the extreme.

The space extending across the eastern end of the room was arranged for cards, for those who preferred a game to dancing, and the large platform was outlined with Indian blankets and fitted out with wicker chairs and soft-shaded lights, so those who wished might watch the merry-makers from there.
