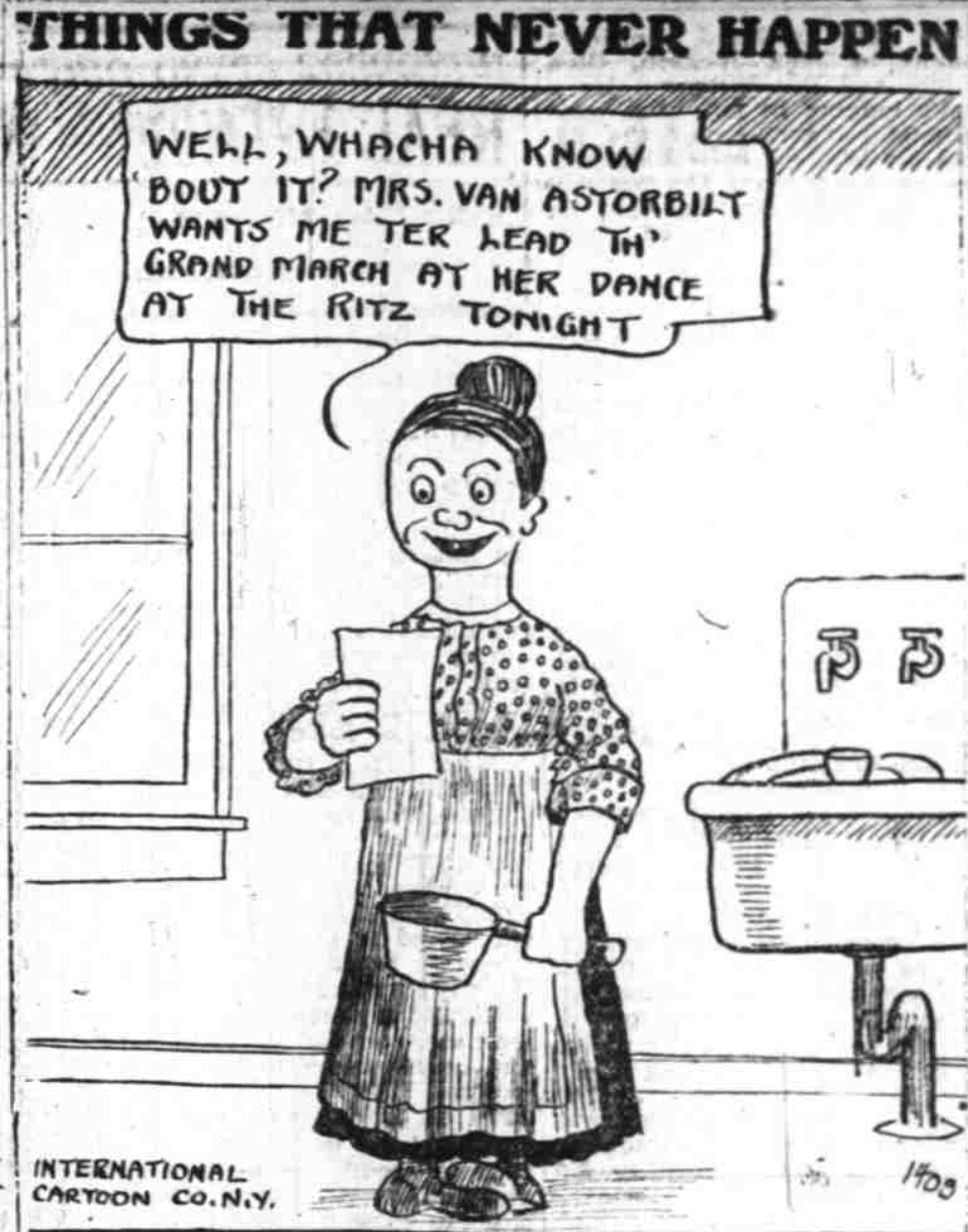

SALEM HIGH WANTS GAME Dallas Cancels Armistice Day Date and Telegrams Are Sent Eastward

An effort is being made by Manager Reinhart of the high school eleven to secure a game here for Armistice day. Telegrams were sent last night to Pendleton, The Dalles and Hood River with the hope of securing a game with one of them. The action last night followed the receipt of a telegram canceling the game which was to be played November 11 with Dallas. Pendleton and The Dalles have strong teams, neither of which have been defeated this season. In the event of their refusal, it is understood that a further effort will be made to secure a game with a championship team. Plans for an excursion are under way to accompany the Salem team when it meets Eugene at Eugene. Last year about 300 rooters went to support the team. The first team received somewhat of a surprise when in the scrimmage last night the second team secured three touchdowns, made by Post, Librich and Jones. The second team is exceptionally strong this year and will supply state championship material for the team next year.

Directly before you is the dining room, 11 feet by 11 feet, 10 inches, with a bay which not only gives it plentiful light, but adds much to its apparent size. A door between this room and the hall insures privacy for the family if a visitor calls at meal time. In front of the dining room is the living room, 11 feet, 10 inches by 16 feet, 2 inches. In front of that is the living porch, six feet wide and going nearly across the front of the house. This porch almost doubles the spaciousness of the living room. The room itself has no fireplace—many do not like that feature in so small a house—and is lighted from three sides. At the rear of the house is the service porch. The kitchen is 12 feet, 10 inches by 8 feet, and gets light from three sides. The ice box is so placed that it can be filled from the porch. The steps leading to the basement stop at a landing on grade level, from which a door opens to the outside. Upstairs are two hall closets, a bathroom, and three bedrooms. One of these is of generous size, the others smaller. Over all is an attic. The house is built of common brick, a material which in sturdiness and unpretentiousness fits the design. Any lighter construction would make the house look flimsy. The gypsum plaster inside is put on metal lath, which makes a splendid fire resisting barrier, and the roof is covered with asphalt shingles, another flame fighting substance. An incendiary would have hard work to burn this house, and when he got through, four-fifths of its value would remain. The first cost is little if any more than that of frame construction, and the value, after a few years of use, is twice as great. The Permanent Building Bureau, in the Chamber of Commerce, Chicago, is prepared to prove these statements and give any help in permanent construction. It would be fine if every home builder could afford a big, broad lot. But this never was the case, and with mounting cost of land and street improvements, it is less so than ever now. A great many people must build their houses on comparatively narrow lots. They can do this and still have attractive homes, if they are careful to secure the right design. The house here shown is only 18 feet wide. Even with the bay and the side entrance, it will go on a 25-foot lot, and go beautifully on a lot 30 feet wide. Opening the door from the side porch, you enter a small hall. On

Olson-Biggs Agreement Is Adopted by State

The state land board at a meeting yesterday adopted the valuation of \$759,000 agreed upon by A. R. Olson, representing the Pacific Livestock company, and J. W. Biggs representing the state on 10,000 acres of the Pacific Livestock company's lands which are to be put on sale. The total represents an average price of about \$75 an acre for the lands. In the sales ex-servicemen are to be given a preferential opportunity to purchase the lands for a period of 90 days dating from No-

ember 7. Sale of the lands is one of the terms of the compromise entered into by the Pacific Livestock company and the state which terminated prosecution of the former by the state to regain title to the lands. AT THE LIBRARY. This week's shelf is filled with books of interest to the more thoughtful readers and students. Few of them are beyond the enjoyment of the average intelligent reader. "The Condensed Chemical Dictionary," a reference and organization of data regarding chemicals and other substances used in manufacturing, a work edited by the staff of the Chemical Engineering catalog. "Elements of Mechanics for beginners in engineering, by Mansfield Merriman. "Principle of Economics", in two volumes, by Prof. F. W. Taussig of Harvard. This is a comprehensive work by one of our foremost economists interesting for the general reader and yet sufficiently concrete to arrest the thought of the student. "Great Astronomers," a group of 20-page biographies by Sir Robert Bell. The collection which begins with Ptolemy forms a brief history of the progress in this science. "Manual of Astronomy," a text book intended for college students, by Charles A. Young. "General Physics" a new edition of this textbook by Henry Crew, not too difficult for high school students perhaps, and organized for teachers preparing for state examinations. "Physiology for High Schools," by Rollin D. Salisbury. "Textbook on the Teaching of Arithmetic" by Alva Walker Stampfer. It is recommended by our state department of education for teachers preparing for state examinations. "American Charities," a revised edition of this standard work, by Amos G. Warner. He discusses the causes and conditions of poverty, the dependent classes, efforts now being made for the betterment of conditions and the organization of charitable work. "The Kingdom of the Child," a plea by Alice Herts Heniger for the larger use of dramatization for the development of spontaneity and imagination in the child. Mrs. Heniger established the Children's Theater in New York 15 years ago, and she has been placed on the faculty of Columbia college. "Well Baby Primer," a pamphlet intended for the mother who does not read English well, prepared by Caroline Hedrick. By means of pictures and simple language it teaches the principles of the care of the baby. "Selected Critical Biography of Publications in English Relating to the World War," by Prof. George F. Boucher. "Behind the Scenes With the Mediums," a revelation of the means by which mediums work their marvelous tricks, by David P. Abbott. "Malvina of Brittany," a novel by Jerome K. Jerome. "The Associate Hermits," by Frank R. Stockton. "Civic Biology," a study of some of the problems to be solved through civic co-operation, presented by Clifford Hodge. The author calls upon communities to work together to conserve the big bird life, to treat the soil and water, to exterminate the rats, the English sparrows, mosquitoes, hookworms, diphtheria and tuberculosis germs. "Verses For Patriots," a collection for young people intended to help teach good citizenship, compiled by Jean Broadhurst.
