Although Salem has the promise of a game with the Portland team, whether it will come to Salem Thanksgiving has not yet been settled.

Knights of Pythias to Distribute to Poor Folk

The Knights of Pythias of Salem, at the regular meeting of the lodge last night voted to give a shower on a date to be decided upon in the near future, when groceries, clothing or any other articles of comfort and necessity will be distributed to the poor people of Salem. The Knights of Pythias lodges throughout the country are following the same plan for the pre-holiday weeks.

A committee composed of Walter Lennan, J. L. Tucker and H. W. Winkler was appointed to take charge of the work and when the date of the shower is decided upon a place of deposit for the articles will be announced. All persons having such articles to contribute will be asked to leave them at the designated place and the Knights will see that they go where they are most needed.

Depreciation Cannot be Charged Up Against State

Depreciation cannot be charged against the state's share of the interstate bridge fund by the board of commissioners of Multnomah county, according to an opinion of Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle in response to an inquiry by Sam A. Kozar, secretary of state.

The Multnomah commissioners raised the question with the secretary of state whether in arriving at receipts and disbursements relative to operation, maintenance and repair of the bridge an item for depreciation should be included. They placed this item at 25 per cent. The attorney general points out that under the law if a profit is shown the commissioners receive 25 per cent as an interstate bridge sinking fund which shall be used for the sole purpose of replacing or reconstructing the bridge when necessary. After this reserve is made Multnomah county keeps 25 per cent of the remainder and 75 per cent goes to the state, but a deduction of 25 per cent cannot be made from the state's share as was believed by the commissioners.

3 DISTRICTS ARE NEEDED

State Veterinarian, in Biennial Report, Recommends Change in Method

Division of the state of Oregon into three livestock sanitary districts with an assistant state veterinarian centrally located in each is one of the recommendations embodied in the biennial report and budget estimates of Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian.

According to Dr. Lytle the assistant in each district should be responsible for livestock sanitary work in his territory. By this arrangement, Dr. Lytle declares, a considerable amount of money could be saved in railroad expenses which now are high. The arrangement would require the appointment of only one additional assistant veterinarian as compared with the present arrangement.

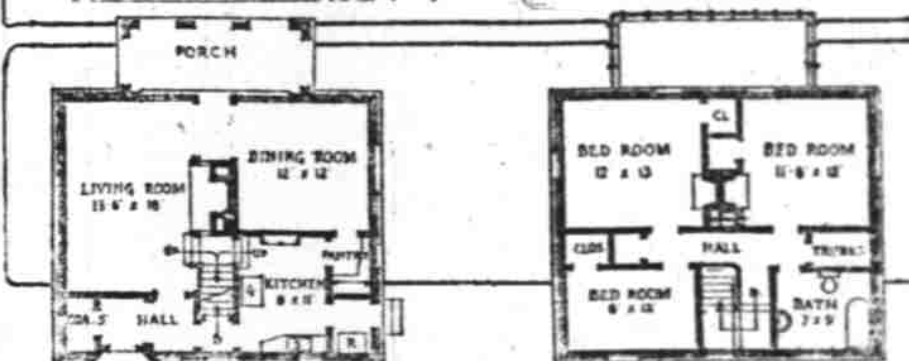
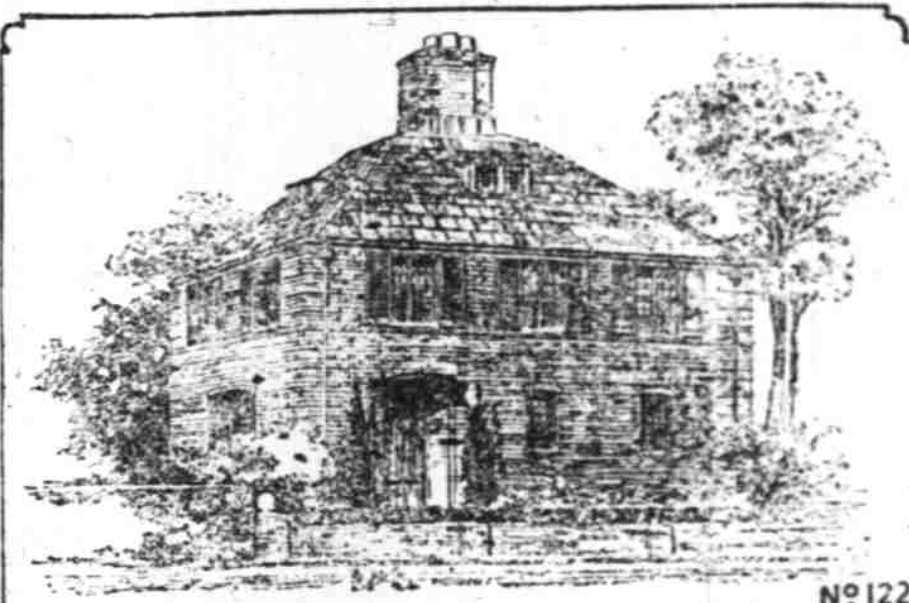

ONE-QUARTER of all the building lots in America face north, either squarely or at an angle; yet not one house in a hundred is planned with special reference to such a lot. That is one reason why we have so many sunless or darkened living rooms.

There is no such drawback in this house. It was designed for a northward facing lot. People do not live in halls, coat closets or stairways, and a kitchen should be designed for coolness. Therefore, the north side of the house is placed on the north, the street side, and living and dining room open to the garden on the south.

The recessed doorway opens into a little hall. On the left is a coat closet, on the right, the passage to the kitchen, with the basement stairs on the way. In front is a living room, 13½ feet by 18, and seeming larger because of the porch at the rear. The stairs go up from the inner wall of this room, and just beside the stairway is the fireplace.

On the other side of the fireplace is an archway to the dining room, 12 feet square. Both living and dining rooms open on a fine porch overlooking the garden, and taking full advantage of its privacy and its sunlight. Think how vines and flowers will nestle up to such a porch.

The kitchen, reached from the

dining room through a pantry, is 8 feet by 11, with a side entrance and a separate approach to the stairs.

The second floor contains three bedrooms and a bath room, a linen closet and a small trunk room. All the bedrooms have closets and cross ventilation, and two of them have open fireplaces. This last feature could be omitted if desired.

The walls of this house are built of face brick, the most varied, interesting and beautiful of all building materials, with either common brick or hollow tile for backing. The inside has gypsum plaster on metal lath, and asphalt shingles protect the roof.

Such a house costs not to exceed 10 per cent more than a wooden one. It is worth at least 40 per cent more the day it is finished, and the difference in value keeps increasing. Face brick has a standing, a "class," which wood cannot hope to rival; and the brick house is cheap to maintain, costs little for insurance, and depreciates very slowly. A frame house may be wiped out at any moment by fire. This brick house would have to be set on fire, and then only a very small part of it would burn.

state be changed relative to cattle.

"The indemnity payable by the state and county should be cut from \$35 for grade animals over 2 years of age to \$25," says Dr. Lytle's report. "The amount of \$50 now paid by the state and county for purebred animals over 2 years of age should remain as it is. The cutting of \$10 for grade animals will permit the state and indemnity laws and the federal laws to work in greater harmony and will result in a considerable saving to the state."

Dr. Lytle's budget estimates the needs of the department for the next biennium at \$82,852.50. Considering a deficiency allowance made some time ago, this is an increase of about \$10,000 over the allowance for the biennium now closing.

Hunters Provided For
For the department proper the estimate for the coming two years is placed at \$60,000. This includes salaries of employees, traveling expenses, office expenses, printing, anti-hog cholera serum and indemnity.

The needs of the predatory animal hunter fund are placed at \$22,500 and the receipts of this part of the department are estimated at \$7,500. The amount needed by the veterinary medical examining board is put at \$352.50, and its receipts at \$392.85.
