BEARCATS ROMP OVER TACOMANS

"Big Chief" Wapato Scores Three Touchdowns Against Opponents

The Willamette Bearcats triumphed over the College of Puget Sound eleven, Saturday, in a classic football contest played before a record crowd in the Tacoma stadium, by a score of 24 to 0.

The Methodists of the north, unable to stop the aggressive onslaughts of the Willamette machine, were forced to abandon the offensive and seek to throw up an impervious wall which proved a mere egg shell before the varsity flying squadron.

"Big Chief" Wapato, tearing through the C. P. S. line by his mighty plunges, carried the pigskin across the goal line once in each of the first three quarters, thus annexing for himself a place on the honor roll of the Cardinal and Gold gridiron heroes.

Irvine's toe was responsible for six of Willamette's tallies when he

kicked three goals and booted a place kick in the fourth period.

Zeller and Rarey performed several sensational feats when, again and again, they charged through the line for substantial gains, while Irvine made several spectacular wide end runs.

Halfback Revell proved the chief ground gainer for the C. P. S. aggregation. During the entire game the northern squad only made three first downs, converting two of these by the aerial route. In the third quarter C. P. S. threatened to score on a fumble, but after they were once

downed they were unable to penetrate the Willamette line. In the fourth quarter the Tacoma men opened up with several forward passes, but were unable to advance through the Bearcats' stonewall when the goal was endangered.

The game was marked throughout by clean, fast playing on the part of both teams, with a greater amount of football tactics displayed by the Willamette aggregation. Willamette made 19 first

downs while C. P. S. only converted three.

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Is Your Child Under Weight?

The heights and weights of the children examined are to be compared with these average heights and weights. No heights and weights are given for the separate months after 48 months. With a child over 4 years of age, use the age at his last birthday.
