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SALEM MAN IS HERO OF WAR

E. G. Gates, Chief Boatwain's Mate, Awarded Medal in Portland

Heroism of E. G. Gates, chief boatwain's mate, U. S. N., during one of the wartime marine disasters, now on recruiting duty in Salem, yesterday was rewarded at an impressive ceremony in the lobby of the Multnomah hotel, Portland, when Admiral R. E. Coontz, chief of the bureau of naval operations, presented the young man with the navy cross awarded by President Wilson.

Accompanying the medal was a citation which Admiral Coontz read to Gates as he stood at attention with an escort of local naval officers. Gates is in charge of the Salem naval sub-recruiting station.

He came from his headquarters at the state capital in answer to a summons issued by Dr. G. S. Whitehead, lieutenant, U. S. N., who is in charge of the local station. He was totally ignorant of the mission to this city until his arrival.

Admiral Coontz was in Portland with the special joint naval committee of congress which is investigating Pacific coast naval stations.

Gates was married to a Portland girl about a year ago and following the advice of the summons issued by Whitehead, she accompanied her husband to Portland and witnessed the ceremony.

The citation fully details the reason for honoring Gates with the navy cross. The citation reads as follows:

"For extraordinary heroism as a member of the crew of boats sent from the U. S. S. Stewart to the rescue of men from the Florence H., which vessel, loaded with explosives, was burned in the harbor of Quiburn on the night of
