

## 2 COMMUNITIES WITHHOLD HELP FROM RED CROSS

Special Solicitors May be Sent to Residents, Says Chairman McDaniel

### VITAL FACT FORGOT

Governor, American Legion, State University Endorse Movement

Chairman B. W. McDaniel of the roll call committee of the Red Cross issued the following statement from Willamette chapter yesterday:

"Although the rumble of the World War has scarcely died away the Red Cross is meeting with apathy, and in some cases virtual opposition, in two localities near the city of Salem. Repeated efforts to secure the aid and co-operation of residents there have to date proven futile. The general opinion in these districts seems to be that the Red Cross is no longer of value. This view is maintained in the face of actual data placed in both localities. The spirit of these people seems to be one of evasion so far as the Red Cross is concerned.

"Many people are over-looking the vital fact that the American Red Cross, authorized by an act of congress dated January 5, 1915, and under the supervision of the war department so far as anything is involved, is an integral part of the governmental system of the United States. As a result, opposition to the Red Cross is tantamount to opposition to the government system of the United States.

**National Barriers Unknown**  
"The American Red Cross knows no national barrier. It is giving aid to every civilized nation regardless of its part in the recent war.

"If these communities fail to organize and co-operate within the next few days, it is the plan of the local headquarters to send workers directly to the districts to carry on the roll call. If such necessity occurs Willamette chapter will make an appeal to the residents of Marion and Polk counties to furnish solicitors who will be willing to sacrifice their time to insure the success of the greatest humanitarian institution the world has ever known."

**Work Called Magnificent**  
Governor Ben W. Olcott has issued the following proclamation to all residents of the state of

Oregon relative to the fourth annual Red Cross roll call which is now being carried on:

"To the fourth Red Cross roll call has been set the period from November 11 to November 25, and I bespeak your hearty assistance in this movement.

"The roll call is not a drive nor a campaign, as I understand it. It is merely a re-enlistment of members for service, and the financial obligation is but \$1 yearly. What the Red Cross accomplished in the great war is so vivid in the minds of everyone that no doubt there will be a spontaneous re-enlistment in membership throughout the state and I feel that many who have failed to join in the past will become members of this splendid organization. I understand the obligations of the organization are heavy and that while peace has returned, nevertheless the American Red Cross is continuing its magnificent work on a large scale and needs the help of all who can give it."

**War Work Recalled**  
Department Adjutant E. J. Eivers of the American Legion for the department of Oregon has written the Red Cross headquarters as follows:

"With my personal knowledge and intimate relations with Red Cross representatives and their work in the rehabilitation of disabled soldiers and the care of their families, I know that the department executive committee would willingly give a unanimous endorsement to your drive for new members.

"Let me personally say as an executive official of the American Legion department of Oregon, that the work of the American Red Cross in the past deserves the most loyal support of all good Americans and I sincerely trust that the fourth roll call will exceed your expectations."

**Educator's Endorsement Given**  
Along the same line is the following statement issued by President P. L. Campbell of the University of Oregon:

"Fullness of life for the indi-

vidual, prosperity for the nation and the peace of the world depend, more than we usually realize, upon the fundamentals of physical vitality and well-being. In mitigating suffering, saving life, facing disaster, and conquering epidemics—even more significantly in measures of decontamination to preserve the health and abolish disease—the American Red Cross and the League of Red Cross societies are the media through which the rank and file of citizenry of this and other nations are co-operating in almost unprecedented manner to realize for those now on earth and for those who are to come the fullest possible measure of freedom and equality—freedom from physical handicap through disease or defect, which insures equality of opportunity. Millions of individual responses to the fourth Red Cross roll call will preserve and demonstrate the essential democracy of the Red Cross movement and insure the continuance of the most hopeful co-operative effort ever undertaken in the interest of public health."
