**Harvard-Yale Game is Eastern Classic**


NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—The Harvard-Yale game, the last of the great eastern inter-varsity football classics is the outstanding contest of tomorrow's gridiron schedule. Regardless of the two defeats which mar the Ells' record and the tie game registered between Harvard and Princeton, interest in the annual battle of the Crimson and Blue transcends that centered in any of the other games.

Harvard will enter the contest in the Yale bow an overwhelming favorite over the home eleven, but the probable playing form of the two teams does not warrant the odds quoted. This one-sided favoritism is based, to a great extent upon the unexpectedly weak showing of Yale against Princeton last Saturday. A careful analysis of that game would appear to indicate that the lapses of the Ells were more mental than physical and if such conclusions are arrived at after a diagnosis after the defeat, a radical development in the Yale play is not only possible, but probable.
