SCHOOL WEEK IS SET ASIDE

Edict of Governor Olcott Designates Period from December 5 to 11

The week from December 5 to 11 has been designated by Governor Olcott as "school week" in Oregon. This action is being taken in other states at the suggestion of P. P. Claxton, commissioner of education for the United States.

The governor asks the co-operation of churches, women's clubs, parent-teacher associations, chambers of commerce, boards of trade, labor unions and other social organizations.

"It is the desire of those interested in education," says the governor, "that the people use this week in such a way as will most effectively disseminate among the people accurate information in regard to the conditions and needs of our schools and enhance

the appreciation and value of education and create such interest as will result in better opportunities for education, as well as a larger interest in schools of all kinds and grades."

A citizens' conference on education is to be held at the Multnomah hotel, Portland, on Saturday, Dec. 4, at the request of Commissioner Claxton. The educational situation is to be discussed by the conference. J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of schools, is sending out invitations to members of the legislature, commercial clubs, women's clubs,

labor unions and other organizations to attend.

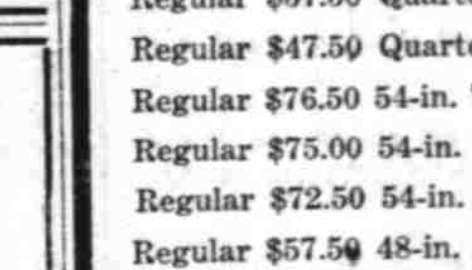
