WHAT promises to be one of the most, if not the most interesting department of the Salem Arts league, is the Interior Decorating section, which was formally organized Monday night in the R. Monroe Gilbert studio, Miss Vivian Hargrove taking charge.

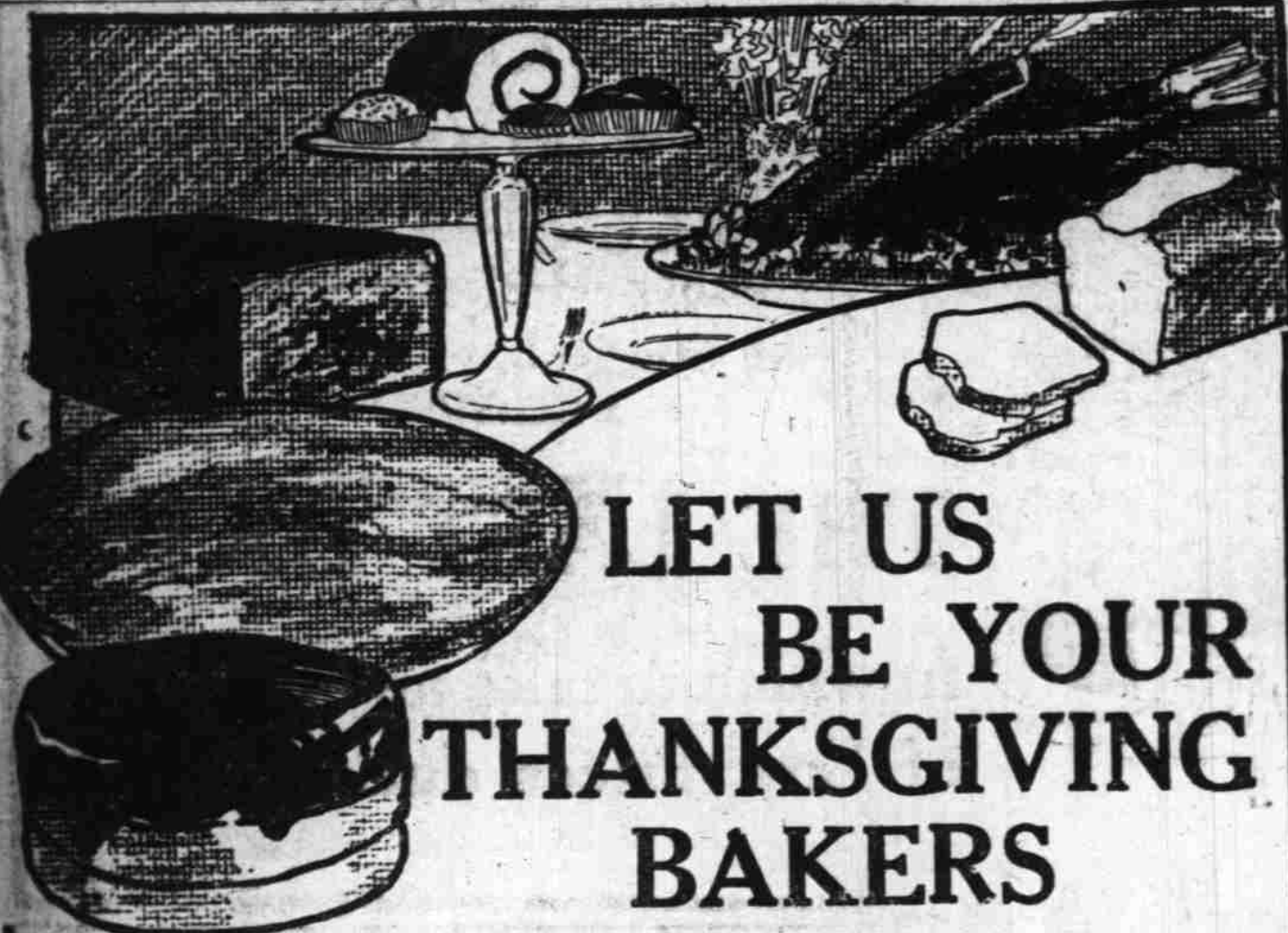
