Oregon Humane Society
Sends Bi-ennial Budget

The Oregon Humane society estimates, in an estimate filed with the secretary of state to be embodied in the state budget estimate, that its needs from the state for the next biennium will be about \$8000.

The society estimates salaries for the two years at \$1860, and replacements, repairs, etc., at \$2000. It realizes about \$14,000 a year from the city of Portland for maintaining the city pound, but all of this money must be used exclusively in the city. The total income from state work, it is said, is not over \$1000 a year, not counting \$500 which is given by the state. This \$1500, it is claimed, is totally inadequate to carry on the state work. A state officer is needed, he report says, at a salary of \$150 a month and \$100 a month allowed for traveling expenses.
