## AGED DALLAS WOMAN PASSES

**Mrs. Anne Elizabeth Campbell Succumbs to Infirmities of Old Age**

DALLAS, Ore., Dec. 4.—(Special to The Statesman)—Mrs. Anne Elizabeth Campbell, more affectionately known to the residents of this city and Polk county as "Aunt Betty," passed away at the family home on Jefferson street late Thursday, the cause of her death being old age.

Mrs. Campbell was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hagood and was born in Virginia March 27, 1844. Her parents afterwards moved to Missouri and in 1853 crossed the plains to Oregon, settling in the Gooseneck section of Polk county where they lived for a time and afterwards moved to Salt Creek where Mrs. Campbell grew up to young womanhood.

On July 4, 1869, she was married to J. M. Campbell and after a short residence on a farm near Dallas they moved to this city where they have since lived, being the oldest resident living here continually since this city was founded.

Besides her aged husband Mrs. Campbell is survived by the following relatives: three daughters; Mrs. J. W. Crider of San Jose, Cal.; Mrs. J. C. Morrison and Mrs. Will May of Salem; two sons, H. H. Campbell and C. C. Campbell of this city; three sisters, Mrs. Frank Hill of Pullman, Wash.; Mrs. Graham Glass of Portland.
