MARKET FUND DISTRIBUTED

State Highway Commission Announces Amounts Going to Counties

The state highway commission Saturday announced the amount of moneys distributed to the counties of the state under the state market road appropriation. The distribution is based on the unpaid one-half of the contribution of the counties to the market road appropriation plus the proportionate share of surplus from Multnomah county, which does not participate in the distribution. The total balance due the counties is \$595,699.97. Marion county receives \$37,695.34. Polk county receives \$20,760.65.

The fund is created by a 1-mill tax levy on the total valuation of the taxable property of the state. By specific provision of the act it is not subject to the 6 per cent tax limitation of the constitution.

Section 2 of the act reads: "Insofar as practicable the state highway commission shall annually apportion the appropriation provided for under this act among the several counties in such amounts that each county shall receive an amount at least equal to its contribution to the appropriation herein provided for, except that no county shall receive in excess of 10 per cent of the total amount raised hereunder in any year. Should any county fail or neglect to accept the provisions of this act, then and in that case the amount apportioned thereto shall be subject to the disposition of the state highway commission for distribution among counties accepting and operating under the provisions of this act."

Any county court desiring to avail its county of the benefits of the act in any year must match the amount available from the state by tax levy on the taxable property in the county sufficient to equal the amount apportioned the county by the highway commission, the money being for the specific purpose of market road construction.

The roads shall be constructed only under the supervision of the county courts, but it shall be the duty of the county courts to request the highway commission to furnish plans and specifications for the proposed market roads and to supervise the surveys and establish the grades. The apportionment by counties announced Saturday follows:
