Trees Are Profitable—
Down at Banks, Washington county, there are two men who earned \$450 in four days cutting Christmas trees. They cut 6000 small fir trees in the four days, and they received 10 cents each for them, delivered to the railroad. But it cost them 3 cents each to have the trees bound into bundles and hauled. So they received net for their four days' work \$420 between them. The submission firm at Portland received 12 1/2 cents each for the trees. What the individual purchasers will pay, in Chicago or St. Louis or New York, the reader may guess. But in some cases it will be nearer \$5 than 10 cents, the original price to the two Banks men. The reader may also point his own moral as to the amount of money the state of Oregon loses by allowing these 6000 Christmas trees to be cut and sold for 10 cents each, when, if they had been left standing 100 years or so they might have grown into trees that would have been built into houses or furniture, etc., each tree would have finally brought as much, perhaps, as \$1000, or even more.
