American Jersey Cattle Club Praises Noted But- terfat Producers

Susy's Twin Maiden 262409, an Oregon Jersey, has just completed her third Register of Merit record. On her third record she produced 12,909 pounds of milk, and 766.04 pounds of fat, test started at nine years and six months of age.

Susy has averaged 11,124.4 pounds milk, 622.36 pounds fat on her three records. She was start-

ed on her first test at 5 years and 6 months of age. Her records are most praiseworthy.

Her sire, St. Mawes 72053 is one of the A. J. C. club's gold medal bulls. Through the productiveness of his 20 Register of Merit daughters he became one of the most prominent bulls of the Jersey herd. However, all his glory came after the butcher bought him for beef.

Her dam is Susy of Forestdale 191571, the dam of four Register of Merit cows, all full sisters, including Susy's Twin Maiden, have each completed three official records. The average of the combined 12 records is 670 pounds fat. St. Mawes Poppy 219992 is a granddaughter of Susy of Forestdale. Poppy has an official record of 952 pound fat, and was at one

time state champion Jersey in Oregon.

Ed. Cary of Carlton, bred this wonderful animal, as well as tested her, thereby giving her the opportunity of having her name inscribed indelibly on the records of the American Jersey Cattle club.

The way Oregon Jerseys have been producing lately would indicate that the Oregon Jersey breeders know how to pick high producers, says a bulletin of the American Jersey Cattle club.

Poppy's St. Mawes Rose 358466 produced on her record just completed 11,871.9 pounds milk, and 711.90 pounds fat. Test started at 4 years and 9 months of age.

Rose carries 50 per cent of the blood of Rosaire's Olga Lad 87498 and over 25 per cent of the blood of St. Mawes 72052. Her sire, Poppy's St. Mawes 15434, has 11 daughters in the Register of Merit. Her dam, St. Mawes Rose 29504 has completed three Register of Merit tests which average 586 pounds fat. She is a double granddaughter of Rosaire's Olga Lad 87498 one of the gold medal bulls of the Jersey breed. He is the sire of 25 tested cows, and 3 Register of Merit sons.

The paternal dam of Rose is St. Mawes Poppy 219992. She has completed three Register of Merit tests that average 850 pounds fat. An achievement, of which few cows may boast. Poppy also has one daughter which has averaged

CONTEST DATES ARE ANNOUNCED

Willamette to Participate in Choice Series of Athletic Contests

The Willamette basketball season in prospect promises to be the greatest in the history of the university with several conference games slated for Salem. Six letter men will be back in suits this year, forming the nucleus of one of the fastest squads ever seen upon a local floor.

A strong schedule of playing games has been arranged with conference teams and these will be supplemented by a number of non-conference clashes. Six conference games will be staged in the armory during the season. The Bearcats will make a tour through Washington and Idaho during the week of February 15 to 22 playing a series of games with University of Idaho, Whitman, Walla Walla Y.M.C.A. and Gonzaga college.

Coach Mathews announces the following schedule, as arranged at the northwestern conference at Spokane, December 10 and 11.

Non-conference clashes will be scheduled with Multnomah, Pacific University, with a probability of Gonzaga playing two games in Salem.

A series of pre-season games will be played before the Christmas holidays, beginning Wednesday with a clash with the Silvertown Athletic club quintet. This game will probably be followed with contests between the Bearcats and North Pacific Dental College, and Dallas American legion the following week.

Five games have been scheduled for the coming baseball conference season, when Willamette twirlers will battle against Whitman in a three-day series May 26, 27 and 28, at Walla Walla, and University of Oregon with a game in Salem April 15, and a second in Eugene on April 16.

Additional games will be arranged at a later date.

Single Taxers Early on Job for 1922 Election

The Oregon Single Tax league is persistent. A proposed constitutional amendment to go on the ballot at the general election in November, 1922, was filed yesterday with the secretary of state, signed by the following officers of the league: Arthur Brock, president; Alfred D. Cridge, vice president; Christina H. Mock, secretary; and J. R. Hermann, manager, all of Portland.

Single tax measures have been defeated repeatedly in Oregon elections, the latest defeat being at the regular election last month by a vote of 147,426 to 37,282. The proposed measure would amend section 1, article IX of the state constitution. It will be referred to the attorney general for ballot title.

The measure reads as follows: "From July 1, 1923, to and until July 1, 1927, all revenue necessary for the maintenance of state, county, municipal and district government shall be raised by a tax on the value of land, in respect of improvements in or on it, and thereafter the full rental value of land, irrespective of improvements, shall be taken in lieu of all other taxes for the maintenance of government and for such other purposes as the people may direct. All provisions of the constitution and laws of Oregon in conflict with this section are hereby abrogated and repealed insofar as they conflict herewith, and this section is self-executing."

FISH AND GAME CLUB ORGANIZED

Local Sportsmen Elect Officers and Send Delegation to Portland

The Mistland Field and Stream club, composed of a coterie of local sportsmen, has been organized in Salem. Its object is to encourage interest in fishing and hunting, to protect fish and game and assist in the re-stocking of streams with fish, to assist the fish and game commission in the distribution of fish and game, assist in procuring legislation and to insist on compliance with the game laws.

Delegates Named. Officers are to be elected annually on the first Monday in December. Membership dues are to be \$1, payable annually.

The following delegates were appointed to attend a meeting of the state fish and game commission in Portland tomorrow: H. W. Meyers, T. B. Kay, S. A. Hughes, K. J. Brown, Paul Hauser and Edward Rostein.

The by-laws read in part as given below:

"The executive committee with the president and vice president who shall act as chairman shall be governed in their actions by the will of the body of the organization and their acts shall be final in such matters that they are unable to present the club at a regular meeting.

Twelve Make Quorum. Meetings shall be held time and place designated by the secretary in notices to members.

"Any vacancies in an elective office of this organization shall be filled by the election of some

member by the executive committee for remainder of the term.

"A quorum shall consist of 12 members. All officers shall make a detailed report at each annual meeting.

"An honorary membership may be given by a vote of the club or

by the unanimous vote of the executive committee.

"Any citizen of this state is eligible to membership.

"These by-laws can be amended at any time. Amendments to be read one meeting and passed at the next."
