The W. A. M. S. club will meet tonight at the home of Miss Goldie Witzel, 415 North Cottage street.

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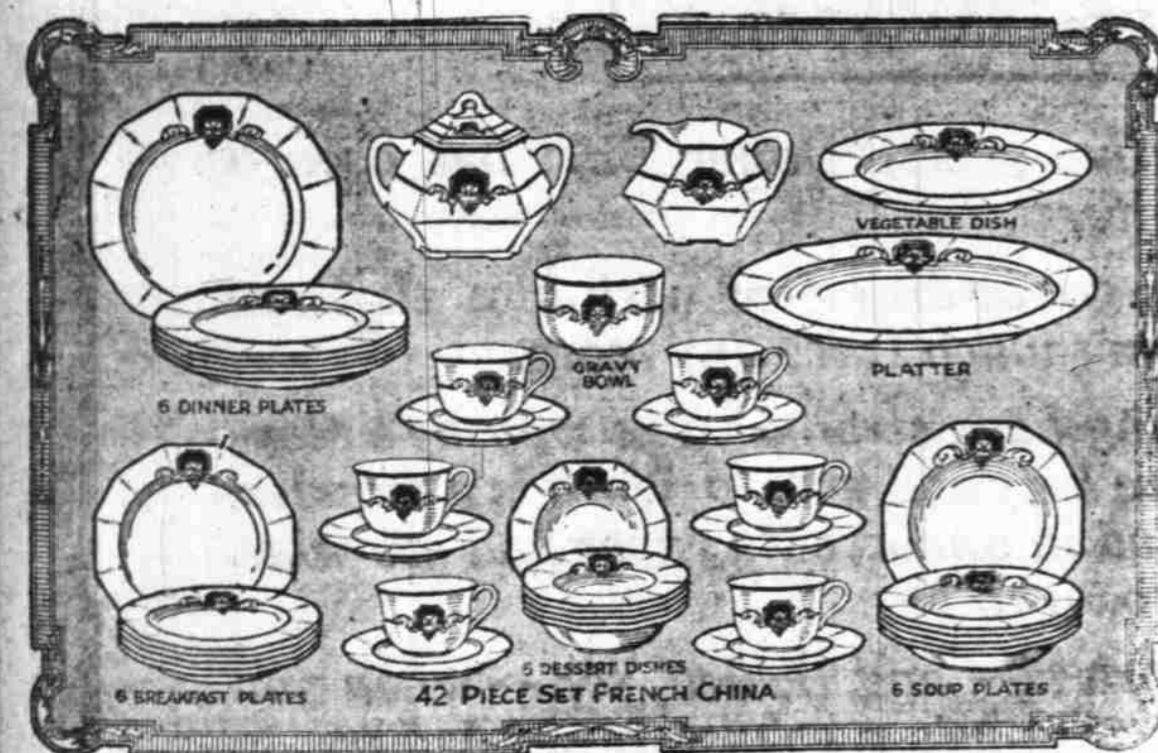
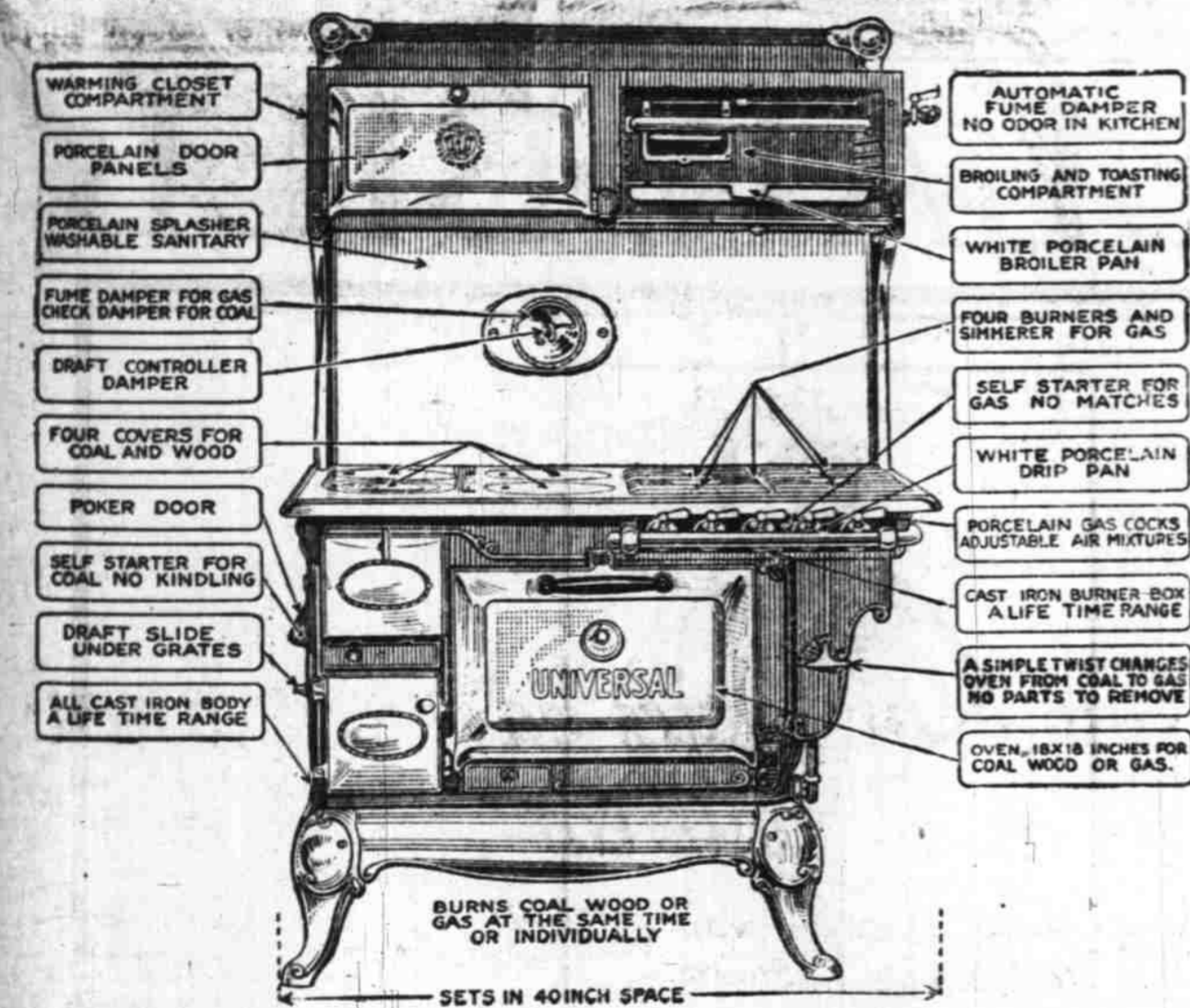
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
