**OLDER BOYS BOOST FOR SQUARE LIFE**

Annual Conference for Western Oregon Closes With Sunday Session

**CHURCHES ATTENDED**

Resolutions Express Thanks for Spirit of Hospitality Shown Here

The Western Older Boys conference of 1920 closed its session Sunday night with a final address and fellowship circle in the Christian church. During the session which lasted three days nearly 400 Oregon youths were in attendance and leaders pronounced it entirely successful despite adverse weather conditions.

The last day's session began with a leaders' meeting in the city hall. Delegates attended church with their hosts and hostesses after which they had dinner with them.

The afternoon session was open to all of the older boys of Salem as well as to the registered delegates. A packed house listened to E. W. Warrington speak on the conference theme "Four Square."

He described a four square life as exemplified by the life of Christ. Walter Jenkins, who created intense popularity at the Saturday night banquet, was in attendance and led the singing.

**New Leader Presides**

The evening meeting, which was open to all of the Salem public, began with a song service led by Dr. H. C. Epler, Robert Litter, this year's president, presided.

In the report of the credential committee the number of delegates according to the cities they represented, their church connection, and their ages, were given. By church membership they were: Methodist 84; Presbyterian, 77; Christian, 52; Baptist, 26; Congregational, 16; Evangelical, 9; Lutheran, 9; Catholic, 6; United Brethren, 4; Episcopal, 4; Friends, 3; Union, 3; Christian Science, 3; Church of God, 1; not members of churches, 31. It is interesting to note that many of those who were not members of churches later expressed their desire to become connected with some Christian organization. All of the 26 leaders were members of some church.

In the report also was the number of delegates according to ages. They were given as follows: Boys of 15 years, 83; 16 years, 103; 17 years, 68; 18 years, 40; 19 years, 24; 20 years, 13; 21 years, 8.

**Resolutions Adopted**

The report of the resolution committee was read and unanimously adopted. It reads: "Be it hereby resolved: That we, the Willamette Valley Older Boys' conference, in session at Salem, Or., December 10, 11 and 12, wish to express our sincere thanks to the citizens of Salem, who have opened their homes to the delegates of the conference, and who have done so much to make our stay here a pleasant one. We wish to thank them one and all for the royal good time they have given us, and for their unstinted hospitality.

"We also wish to thank the First Christian church and the Methodist churches for the use of their buildings, the Mothers club of Salem for the fine dinner which they served to us Saturday evening. To the Girls' Reserve, who served the dinner. Our words are insufficient to express our thanks, and we hope that we will be able to serve them in a similar capacity in the near future. Also to the mayor of this city and the general committee in charge of the members of the Hi Y club, and to other individuals and committees who have had anything to do with the arrangement of the conference. It is almost impossible for us, as boys, to express our deep appreciation of that we have for the officers, speakers and especially the director, for their untiring efforts in making this conference the success which we believe it to be.

**Club Work Favored**

"Be it further resolved. That we pledge our whole-hearted support to the state committee of the Y. M. C. A., that we will carry our reports home and will do the best to further the work of this great movement. That we will further the establishment of Hi Y clubs and that we will not only do these things with the best that is in us but will try to inspire others and win them to this great cause.

"Be it further resolved. That it is the duty of everyone attending this conference to give our material, financial and spiritual support to the great project which Henry art is carrying on in India.

"Further. That each member of this conference strive to work into his life the principles of the 'Four Square' man as has been brought out in this conference and its speakers.

"We, the committee elected at this Older Boys' conference, do hereby request that this be spread upon the minutes of this meeting and published in the Salem papers."

The report was signed by H. A. McArthur of West Lynn, N. F. Tyler of Woodburn and R. C. Adams of Portland.

The address of the evening was given by Paul L. Nowmyer, former state boys secretary, Oregon and Idaho conference director. He spoke forcefully on the need of nerve and courage in meeting the problems before the boys of today who are trying to raise moral standards. Following his address one minute was allotted each leader in which to present the thought which he wished the boys to take home with them.

**State Committee Thanked**

At the end of the service the young men formed a fellowship circle, a circle of delegates formed by linking hands. It extended entirely around the church.

The conference was extremely

successful in many ways and while it was the direct result of the action of the boys, it is said a great deal of credit should be given to the formulators of the conference plan and those under whose direction the conferences are given. The state committee of the Y. M. C. A. inaugurated the system and is promoting it.

**MOTOR VEHICLE HEADS TO MEET**

**Kozer Suggests Conference in Letter to Other Secretaries of State**

That a meeting of representatives of the offices of the secretaries of states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and California be held at some central point in the near future, to discuss interstate automobile regulations is suggested by Sam A. Kozer, secretary of state for Oregon. In letters addressed to secretaries of the other three states, the suggestion was made to Mr. Kozer by T. A. Rafferty, chief inspector for the Oregon department of state in the enforcement of the motor vehicle laws.

Mr. Kozer's letter follows: "All Motorists Interested. At the suggestion of T. A. Rafferty, chief inspector for the department in the enforcement of the motor vehicle laws of this state, I am addressing you relative to a proposed conference between the departments of the states of Washington, California, Oregon and Idaho, vested with the administration of the laws relating to the registration of motor vehicles and the enforcement of such laws and traffic regulations, as they may apply to the operation of licensed motor vehicles.

The fact that there is much interstate business between the states named, and also that many

of the residents of these states are constantly traveling to and fro, makes matters relating thereto a subject of much interest to all motorists. For example: uniform laws should exist especially in these states affecting motor vehicles entering one state from another in the transportation of persons or commodities for hire or profit; the length of time foreign licenses may be recognized in each state, whether purchased or when the owner has been a resident of the state for some time, or by persons who may have just recently established residence; the registering in of residents of other states upon their entry into the states, and many other similar matters.

**Some Laws Indefinite.**

"We all know that the interests of the four states named are

correlated and the laws of some of them in many respects indefinite, and without provisions covering some of the matters referred to. In view of this condition it appears to me that it would be productive of good results if a meeting of representatives of the respective departments could be arranged for at some central place, at an early date, in order that uniform provisions affecting these matters may be formulated, and efforts made to secure their incorporation in our motor vehicle laws at the forthcoming sessions of our legislative assemblies.

I should be very much pleased to have an expression from you regarding this proposal, and if it meets with your approval to suggest a place and a time when it would be convenient for you, or a representative of the department, to meet with a representative of this department. Steps, however, should be taken before the holidays, as the legislatures

at the various states will be in session in January next."

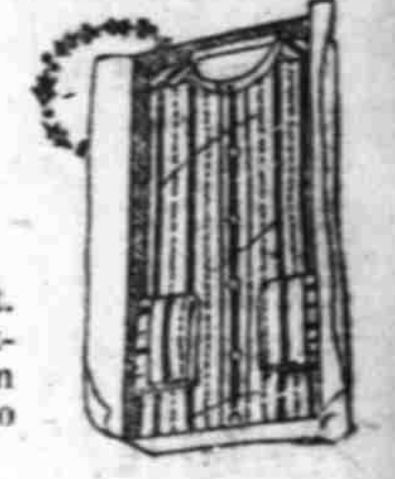
