KERR TALKS TO MEN'S SOCIETY
Accomplishments of Education Told by Agricultural College President

The "six O'clock club" of the First Methodist church, at its meeting last night by Dr. W. J. Kerr, president of the Oregon Agricultural college with a powerful plea in behalf of education. The meeting was largely attended, and President Doney of Willamette University presided and introduced the speaker.

Dr. Kerr quoted figures taken over a term of years from all over the United States to show the great value of education to the individual in terms of dollars and cents in the way of much greater earnings in the five years after college than in the 10 years after public school for the student who goes directly from the grammar school to a position.

Accomplishments Told

Dr. Kerr told of the wonderful things accomplished by scientists through education during the past 50 years, in science, industry, agriculture and in medicine, having benefitted the human race by the billions, in terms of dollars, in the addition of 15 years to the average life, and a probability of another 15 years being added to the average life of the future by science.

"As much has been added to the pleasure of living by the training of the mind to enable us to enjoy life, and by adding the modern inventions that add to our enjoyment and comfort of living," said Dr. Kerr.

The speaker dwelt at length on the accomplishments of education in Oregon by the improvement in agriculture and fruit growing here and cited specific instances where millions of dollars have been added to the wealth of the state by the improvement of crops and the eradication of pests.

Practical System Urged

Dr. Kerr closed with an eloquent plea for a higher system of practical education, for the elimination of useless studies and the substitution of practical useful subjects. He asked that leaders be trained, and that all of the people be trained for mass leadership in good citizenship, eliminating the teaching and talking of any language in the public institutions except English. He re-

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ferred to the fact that the war records showed that 25 per cent of the young men called into the present war were illiterate and that millions of ignorant foreigners coming to American shores, who must be assimilated and brought up to American standard of living and thinking, if this republic is to be maintained and continued to grow and prosper.

Lastly, the speaker declared that any system of education must be built upon the firm foundation of Christianity, and that men be
