Samples Displayed—Samples of building stone taken from the Tufa mine on Abiqua creek, above Mt. Angel, were brought to the city yesterday by J. Warren Gould, owner of the mine. The stone is composed of a volcanic ash, imbedded and compressed for centuries of time until it has become especially adapted for building purposes. That which is waste after cutting the stone into blocks is formed into a powder. From this powder an ingredient has been found that is useful in the manufacture of rubber and therefore valuable. The powder yields from 30 to 34 per cent of this ingredient.

CLUBMEN HEAR DR. LOVEJOY

Cause of Starving Children of Europe Presented to Rotarians

The Salem Rotarians had a rare treat yesterday, in listening to an address by Dr. Esther Pohl Lovejoy, at the regular Wednesday noon lunch hour.

Dr. Lovejoy is chairman of the executive board of the American Women's Hospitals Reconstruction committee of the Medical Women's National association, affiliated with the American Red Cross and other organizations that were engaged in war work and are now giving attention to peace and reconstruction service.

She was a candidate for congress in the Portland district at the last election, on the Democratic ticket, and came nearer to victory than the average Democratic candidate this year.

Dr. Lovejoy has written a book, "The House of the Good Neighbor," and Herbert Hoover has written the foreword; of which more at a later date. She is a practicing physician in Portland.

Dr. Lovejoy was a Salem boy as everybody knows, and he would not be asking for \$7000 from Salem at this time if he did not realize that this amount is necessary to save the European children from starving.

This drive is under the direction of Herbert Hoover, and the first step is to get the money. Dr. Lovejoy yesterday who will not drive that is on for next week, for the fund to feed the three and a half million starving European children.

Japan Welcomes Canceling of Gentleman's Agreement

TOKIO, Dec. 14.—Resolutions "welcoming" a cancellation of the Gentleman's Agreement between Japan and the United States, providing that some sort of a substitute could be agreed upon free from discrimination, were adopted at a joint meeting of the Japanese Peace Society and the American Peace Society. This action was the result of three meetings of the two societies.

It was asserted in the resolutions that, in the opinion of the two societies, Japan had kept the Gentleman's Agreement both in spirit and in letter. The resolution declared also that the two societies would welcome the adoption of any measures by internal legislation in the United States or by convention that would promote the standard of living and social conditions of Japanese in the United States so as to prepare them for assimilation as citizens of the American commonwealth. Confidence was expressed that any conditions that might arise between the two countries would in the end be settled on a satisfactory basis of humanity, reason and justice.

The California Land Bill (adopted in the election November 2) was described in the resolution as "too harsh and sweeping in its terms to accord with the high principles we have just mentioned. Yet we believe that we can firmly rely on the sense of justice and humanity of both the citizens of that state and of the United States to right any wrong steps that may be taken," the resolution added.

"We would urge our fellow countrymen to be patient and self-possessed and free from excitement over any unfavorable conditions in California. We would call attention to the diplomatic negotiations now going on between Japan and the United States and the importance of exercising the utmost confidence in the ability of the two countries to work out an acceptable solution of pending problems."

The Japanese Peace Society and the American Peace Society were established for the purpose of promoting friendship and peace between Japan and the United States.

Police Watch Soviet Republic Celebration

LONDON, Dec. 14.—Under the tolerant but watchful eyes of the English police the third anniversary of the Russian Soviet republic was commemorated in London and some provincial centers by Communist meetings, at which cheers were raised for Lenin and the social revolution.

The biggest demonstration was held at the Albert Hall, in London, under the auspices of the "Hands off Russia" committee and the British Communist party, and the speakers included the former Colonel C. L. Malone, member of parliament and Cathal O'Shannon, of the Irish Communist party.

One resolution called upon the Council of Action to send an ultimatum to the government demanding peace with Russia by a certain date; failing which, there would be a national strike.

One of Malone's statements was to the effect that Soviet Russia had raised 4,000,000 rubles for the Sinn Fein; but Cathal O'Shannon later said this money had not yet been received in Ireland.

All the speakers said they wanted a revolution at the earliest possible moment, but they admitted that "the British workers were the greatest obstacles to revolution."

King Albert Meets With Difficulties in Spain

SALAMANCA, Spain, Dec. 14.—King Albert of the Belgians had an unpleasant journey through Portugal and Spain on his return trip from Brazil. The Portuguese government placed, for the former royal railroad car, now allocated to the president of the republic, at his disposal.

When all was ready for the start from Lisbon some one discovered that all the telegraph wires along the track to be followed to the frontier had been cut, so it was impossible to signal. A provisional system was organized and the royal passenger was sent on his way.

Further inconveniences then King Albert had been placed at the head of the train and all the odors of the kitchen were forcibly wafted into the King's salon. A halt was called and the dining car shifted to the rear.

After dinner, when his majesty prepared to retire, it was discovered that there was no heating apparatus on the train and, as the weather in the mountains was cold and the King had just come from a hot climate, all the spare blankets on the train were requisitioned to keep his majesty warm through the night.

California Gold Mining Reaches Its Lowest Ebb

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 14.—Gold mining, an industry which virtually brought California into existence, has reached the lowest ebb in the history of the state. Fletcher Hamilton, state mineralogist, announced here recently after a tour of the state.

"One appears to be traveling in the wake of a pestilence," Mr. Hamilton said. "In visiting the mining districts where the industry was founded and from where nature's golden harvest has been poured forth for the past 70 years, towns and whole counties are being depopulated. Mines are being abandoned to fill with water and mills and reduction plants are being abandoned to the elements."

Mr. Hamilton pointed out that gold production has decreased because the price of gold has never joined the upward rush of other prices. The gold miner, he said, receives no more for his product than he did 50 years ago.
