DATE IS SET FOR DEBATES

Salem High School is Again in Line for Championship of Oregon

The first of the high school inter-scholastic debates to be staged in Salem this season will be held on Friday, January 28 when the Salem affirmative team meets the Oregon City negative, according to the schedule received by Principal J. C. Nelson of the local school.

The Salem negative goes to Stayton on the same night to meet an affirmative team. This is the first year in which Stayton has tried for the state championship cup.

The affirmative team defending the honors at home is composed of Ralph Bailey, Ralph Southworth, while Robert Little and Ralph Elumons, composing the negative team vie for honors at Stayton.

The work of the teams is now well under way under the leadership of Harry Savage. Prospects are bright for Salem capturing the state cup, which it won this time, becomes a permanent possession.

As has been the custom in the past the state has been divided into districts, each of which sends one champion to Eugene at the end of the season to try for the state championship. Leaders in each district are chosen by triangular elimination debates, the first in this district being Oregon City, Stayton and Salem. The Oregon City affirmative meets the Stayton negative at Oregon City. The champion of this triangle will meet those two others.

Training School Boys Start Early for Home

Two boys of good standing in the state training school, determined to go home early for Christmas and avoid the rush without waiting for the consent of the superintendent of the school. They left the yard at dark Wednesday, and were returned at noon yesterday.

On reaching the institution it was found that one of them had helped himself to a boy's coat, a part of a new suit. The other boy came in with an excellent blue plaid mackinaw. The boys claimed to have gotten their supper and breakfast, and slept in the barn at the home of a farmer two or three miles from Shaw. They admitted taking the garments from the home of the next neighbor to the man who had given them shelter and food.

Yesterday morning the boys were seen on the railway track, by a Mr. McCallister near Shaw. They told him they were going to get to Albany, while they were really going toward Portland. Mr. McCallister called to inquire if the boys had escaped from the institution. When he found they had he took them to a store at Shaw, and they were reclaimed by the superintendent at noon yesterday. A reward of \$5 for each of the boys was paid.

In speaking of the incident Superintendent Gilbert said:

"If the people of this valley could be brought to realize the fact that the boys who sneak away from this institution, does so with the determination to prey upon the people all along the way they would confer a real favor on their community by using the phone to find out who the boys are."

"We have been exceedingly fortunate during the past six months by having few attempts at escape, and generally have been favored by the use of the phone, on the part of those who had reason to believe that the boys were running away from here."

Last night a neighbor of the man who lost the clothing called up to inquire if the boys, who were captured at Shaw, had clothing that did not belong to them. The clothing was identified and will be returned to the owner. It is thought the boys have been taught a lesson to regard the property rights of others."
