

POINDEXTER BILL PASSES

Controversy Results as Late Senators Rush to Call for Reconsideration

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16.—Another controversy in congress over anti-strike legislation was launched today through passage by the senate of the Poindexter bill to penalize interference with inter-state commerce.

Less than a dozen senators were present when the bill went through without a word of discussion, or a roll call, but opponents, rushing in late, announced a contest. Senator LaFollette, Republican, Wisconsin, filed a motion to reconsider the vote, which holds the bill in the senate until disposal of the recon-

eration motion. When the LaFollette motion would be taken up was not determined.

The bill was introduced by Senator Poindexter, Washington, and passed today would not prevent individuals from quitting their employment, but fixes severe penalties for persons who, with intent to obstruct interstate commerce, advise, persuade or use force toward inducing common carriers operatives to cease work.

The measure, which has been criticized vigorously by labor leaders, was presented at the last session after the house had refused to accept the anti-strike clauses in the transportation act proposed by the senate.

The senate passed the bill today while the clerk was drawing through minor bills on the routine calendar under a unanimous consent agreement.

Objection of a single senator would have blocked its consideration or a quorum call would have summoned its opponents. Neither move came, however, from the small handful of senators in their

seats. The activity of opponents followed. Besides Senator LaFollette's motion for reconsideration, Senator Johnson, Republican of California, made inquiry of Vice President Marshall to receive assurance that the motion was pending and the bill held up. The motion for reconsideration under the senate would be considered regularly at the next reading of the calendar, probably Monday. Senator Poindexter was said to be confident that a majority could not be secured to overturn the senate's passage of the measure, but opponents were preparing for a vigorous fight when the LaFollette motion is taken up.

FARMERS RELIEF IS HEARD TODAY

Emergency Program of Tariff Legislation to be Formulated

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16.—Members of the senate finance and the house ways and means committees will meet in joint conference tomorrow to formulate an emergency program of tariff legislation to act as an embargo and give relief to the farmers from the decline in prices.

Decision to hold the conference was reached late today by Republican members of the committees who agreed that speedy action necessary. They determined also to make the program non-political if the minority members would co-operate.

Primary consideration will be given on the program to import duties on wheat and wool, the producers of which, Chairman Fordney of the ways and means committee, said were now "practically broke" as the result of falling prices. The portion of the program relating to the tariff was declared, however, to be more comprehensive and to include consideration of protective levies on scores of other commodities. Possibility of the conference deciding to wipe out the free list of the Underwood tariff act was declared to be within range of action.

Re-enactment of portions of the Dingley tariff also was being talked of among the more ardent high tariff supporters. Mr. Fordney, however, said he was in favor of rushing through the emergency protection for wheat and wool and a few other commodities and letting other tariff matters go over for hearings and further consideration. Clamor for relief legislation of a tariff nature with duties so high they would serve practically as an embargo, may be too strong a tide to be halted, conservative supporters of the program contend.

Seventeen Year Old Girl Tells Story of Shack

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 16.—Miss Jessie Montgomery, 17 years old, described on the witness stand tonight the attacks on her in a so-called "vice shack" here which led indirectly to the slaying of three peace officers at Santa Rosa, near here, December 5 and the lynching of the three alleged slayers December 10.

Miss Montgomery, testifying in the trial of Edmond Murphy, alleged gangster, which began this morning, told a jury which included two women how she and her chum, Miss Jean Stanley, went into the house with Murphy and four others accused in separate indictments of attacks on the two girls, how Murphy and Edward Krivosky tore her clothes from her, and how she was submitted to insults, indignities and brutalities by Murphy and others.

With the entire criminal court building virtually an armed camp against possible mob violence, the jury was selected late today.
