Nations Sign Protocol

## **Approving World Court**

**500 TURKEYS ARE SOLD** 

ROSEBURG, Or., Dec. 17 .-

GENEVA, Dec. 17 .- Nine nations, led by Japan today signed a protocol giving executive approval to the international court of justice set up by the league of nations. Portugal signed a provision for obligatory jurisdiction while the other nations simply gave their consent to the court plan without the obligatory pro-

The latter nations were Greece. Paraguay, Uruguay, Siam, New Zealand, Norway and Sweden. There was no coremony, the dele-gates simply affixing their signatures to the portocol. It is expected that from four to six other nations will ratify the court project before the adjournment of the assembly tomorrow night.

### SANITATION IMPROVED.

Rev. A. J. Weigle from Wash-ington will preach here Sunday at 3 p. m.




