PRUNE MENU IS BANQUET FARE

Directors of Co-operative Association Served Mistland Products

A prune menu was featured yesterday noon at the luncheon given at the Hotel Marion for the directors of the Oregon Growers' Co-operative association, who met in Salem in quarterly session at the offices of the association on the fifth floor of the Masonic temple.

It was felt especially appropriate that as the association is now putting on an advertising campaign in the east on prunes under the new brand name of "Mistland", that there should be a practical demonstration as to what really can be done with the Oregon prunes when it comes to serving luncheons.

Each of the special combinations on the menu was prepared by Frank Tenaka, chef of the Marion hotel, formerly with the St. Francis, San Francisco.

At the all-day session of the directors, reports were made by R. C. Paulus, manager of the sales department; C. I. Lewis, manager of the organization department; J. O. Holt of Eugene, in charge of the packing department; M. O. Evans, manager of the field department, and W. I. Staley, secretary and treasurer of the association.

The meeting yesterday was the regular quarterly meeting of the board of directors and of the executive committee. At the meeting scheduled for January 10, known as the annual meeting of directors, there will be submitted the annual report of the association and also the names of those who have been elected directors for the coming year.

Including in the menu served at the Marion, was a "Mistland" mince meat pastry pie, from prune mince meat manufactured at the Eugene plant of the association. Mr. Holt told the directors and officials that the mince meat now sold here, is manufactured mostly by big packing houses and firms in the east, but now that he was convinced the prune mince meat made in Eugene was superior, he felt that not only would the home product be sold in the western markets instead of the eastern product, but that eventually Mistland prune mince meat would be sold in the east and even exported.

Fifth mass, 10 o'clock. A high mass, assisted by regular choir; sermon by Rev. J. R. Buck.

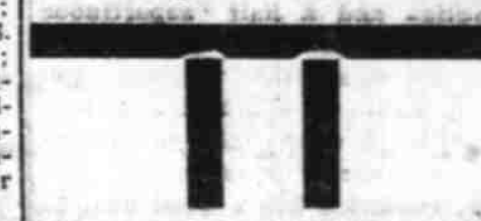
