OREGON LANDS OPEN TO ENTRY

Veterans of Late War May Secure Homestead in Harney and Malheur

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 27.—About 3500 acres of land in Harney and Malheur counties were opened to homestead and desert land entry to veterans of the late war on December 24 according to a notice issued today by the local field division of the department of the interior. Nearly 3,000 acres of the land, however, are subject to improvement work for the Warm Springs reservoir. Tracts that remain unclaimed on December 25 were placed available to entry by the general public. The lands lie along the Malheur river and are mountainous in character.
