

TRAPSHOOTERS OPEN SESSION

Association Standardizes Rules for National Tournaments

CHICAGO, Jan. 7.—The American trapshooting association opened its annual meeting today, but because of the large volume of business to be attended to, the award of the grand American handicap will be made at tomorrow's session, Cleveland, Atlantic City and Chicago are the chief contestants for the shoot.

The association standardized rules for the national tournaments by deciding on 200 targets for all championship meets. It also was decided to hold a professional event in connection with all state and national tournaments, the shoot to be from a 16-yard rise and at 200 targets.

into two zones, the northwestern, to include Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana; the southern zone will be made up of California, Nevada, Utah and Wyoming. Yearly averages will be computed from a basis of 1000 registered targets instead of from 2000 as heretofore.

The Panama Canal zone was granted a district association and will be represented in the grand American.

Zone championships were awarded as follows: Eastern at New Haven, Conn.; Southern at Atlanta, Ga.; Great Lakes at Minneapolis, Minn.; Prairie at Huron, S. D.; Pacific coast at Tacoma, Wash. No dates were set.

WHITE ASKS SANCTION TO ROUND UP DODGERS

Military courts are charged with the trial of all men apprehended, said Colonel White. "The procedure is to turn the deserters over to the nearest military post. It is a deplorable fact that practically nothing has been

done by the government since the war ended to round up these offenders. The whole problem should have been dealt with long ago as it is difficult to see any other obstacle to a round-up than a set disinclination to act."

Three Counties Clean.
Six hundred and sixty-three names now remain on the Oregon slacker list, after deducting the 21 names of soldiers and sailors. Of these Multnomah county contributed 316, or nearly half. Clatsop county stands second on the list with 54. But three counties returned a clean slate—Wheeler, Lincoln and Benton—not a single draft deserter appearing in any of those counties.

Of the 51 names removed by Colonel White from the official list, 17 were overseas soldiers, three were killed in the war and their names appear on the state's honor roll, 15 served in the navy and the others served in the army in the United States. An investigation of the cause of these errors was asked for some time ago.

and second line vessels of this type. In the first line classification, the British navy has 334 destroyers built and 11 building; the United States 260 in service and ten authorized but not under construction; Japan 27 built, 15 under construction and probably 30 others authorized; France ten completed and one building and Italy ten in service and 11 authorized.

Although the United States is Great Britain's only serious competitor in the matter of submarine strength, there is no evidence in tables of anything approaching equality in this branch of naval strength. England has 71 first line submarines in service, 60 in the second line, 18 first line submarines and ten second line submarines authorized; Japan 27 built, 15 under construction and probably 30 others authorized; France ten completed and one building and Italy ten in service and 11 authorized.

Against this great undersea fleet of 165 vessels the United States could show a total of 98 submarines of all types, divided into 52 first line and 46 second line short radius craft, two fleet submarines and no cruiser submarines with 46 others of various types authorized. The United States has none of the great monitor submarines mounting 12-inch guns, Japan has no first line submarines of any class, ten second line short radius vessels and no fleet, cruiser or monitor types although about 40 submarines of all classes have been authorized. France has 62 submarines in service of all types and none building and Italy 22 built and eight building.

The total first line ship strength of the three powers January 1 is placed as:
Great Britain, 522 ships of 1,601,652 tons; United States, 330 vessels of 766,773 tons; Japan, 43 ships of 340,596 tons.
A comparison of the boardside gun power of the first line capital ships mounting 12-inch guns and up shows the following:
Great Britain, 238 guns; United States 176 guns and Japan 96 guns. These figures take into account only vessels completed.

State Heavily Damaged by Recent High Water

Herbert Nunn, state highway engineer, estimates that damage to Oregon roads by high water recently will cost the state between \$75,000 and \$100,000. While no bridges or culverts have gone out, slides have caused considerable amount of damage and about 100,000 cubic yards of earth are to be removed as a result of slides. About 20,000 yards of earth was washed down upon the Roseburg-Myrtle Point highway and the road between Monroe and Junction City has been under water, which will doubtless cause some damage. Slides were heavy on both the upper and lower Columbia River highways.
