The brief to be filed in behalf of Mr. Robbins tomorrow sets up the contention that the roads in the Rocky Mountain National park are public roads and that the right to use these roads for either business or pleasure is a common right. The brief argues in behalf of Mr. Robbins that a monopolistic

transportation concession in this park abrogates the road rights of endividuals and the public. Motopolies are odious in law, it is urged, and when they are claimed it is required that express and indubitable authority be shown for their creation. No authority is declared, is conferred either expressly or by implication upon the park officials. The brief further holds that the

robibition of all carriers except he monopoly carriers affects the value of privately owned land and ives over municipally owned roads to a monopoly, contrary to he terms of the act creating the mrk, which provided that "no lands located within the park houndaries now held in private, nunicipal or state ownership. shall be affected by or subject to the provisions of this act." The brief further quotes the

act creating the park as providing that the public have the 'freest use' of the park and that the park also have "reasonable rules and regulations not inconristent with the laws of the United States." These three definite reservations, it is declared, have been violated through moropolization of transportation.
