

### ARGUES FOR 5 CENT TARIFF

#### McNary Makes Plea to Protect Oregon Industries

SENATOR Charles L. McNary wired the Oregon Growers Co-operative association January 11 as follows:

"Appeared before senate finance committee today and offered argument in favor of five cents a pound on cherries in brine, walnuts and filberts. Committee took matter under advisement. Have strong hopes of cherries in bill as it comes out of committee. Should I fail, before committee, will offer amendment on floor of senate."

This was in response to several telegrams to Senator McNary sent by the Oregon Growers Co-operative association, urging that in this proposed tariff bill before congress, a duty be placed on cherries and walnuts, as these industries of Oregon were threatened with disaster. Due to the low rate

of exchange, Italy has been selling white cherries in brine in New York at 7 cents a pound. To compete this would mean about 3 cents a pound next season for Oregon growers.

The walnut industry is also threatened by imports from China and Japan the past season, as these Manchurian walnuts were selling at 7 cents a pound wholesale. To compete with such a price would spell ruin to Oregon growers. China and Japan are shipping to this country four times the amount of walnuts they did in 1919. Growers feel that unless something is done to prevent the importation of nuts from Japan, the industry will be in bad shape for several years.

#### Bill Proposes to Amend Election Law

### LEWIS TALKS TO STUDENTS

#### Fruit Marketing Subject of Lectures by Salem Man

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Jan. 13.—The first of a series of lectures on co-operative marketing of fruits was given by Prof. C. I. Lewis, manager of the Oregon Growers' Co-operative association in the "Y" hut Monday night. The lectures will be given regularly every Monday night at 8:15, and will cover every phase of commercial fruit marketing.

Professor Lewis was formerly head of the department of horticulture at O. A. C., and since severing connections with this institution has followed the practical side of fruit marketing as manager of the Oregon Growers' Co-operative association with offices at Salem.

Statistics showing the wealth of fruit products in California were given. A half billion dol-

lars' worth of fruit was marketed through the fruit growers' exchanges of California last season, Professor Lewis said.

#### Yamhill Forum Passes Resolutions

DAYTON, Or., Feb. 11.—The Yamhill county forum at a recent meeting at McMinnville, Oregon, after a thorough discussion unanimously passed the following resolutions:

"Whereas, in all former bond issues in Oregon for road purposes the funds have been applied to main arteries of transportation and each time the agricultural interests have been asked to wait until next time and whereas it is generally believed that the coming legislature will authorize another large bond issue for road purposes,

"Therefore, be it resolved that the Yamhill County Public Forum, composed of delegates from every city and school district of Yamhill county, that the legislature be asked to provide that 50 per cent of any proposed bond issue be set apart for the use of agricultural roads, lateral, cross and feeder roads. That the president of this forum in particular

and all members of the executive committee in general be constituted a legislative committee for the purpose of securing the passage of the provision of this resolution.

"Whereas, it is not easy to expend public funds hurriedly without waste.

"Therefore, be it resolved that a law should be enacted requiring all county courts or other public agencies purchasing machinery or supplies for public use to proceed as follows:

"Should the amount to be expended amount to or exceed \$500, said court or other public purchasing agency shall advertise for bids for such materials and shall purchase from the good and responsible bidder who shall offer satisfactory materials, or machinery at lowest prices.

"Whereas, the welfare of agriculture, horticulture, dairying and all productive industries would be much benefited if markets were sure, stable, reliable—and

"Whereas, California has greatly benefited all producing classes by enactment of effective marketing laws,

"Therefore, be it resolved, that we urge the legislature of Oregon to enact marketing laws similar in effect to the marketing laws of California."
