SEEK MARKET COOPERATION

National Wool Growers Hold Busy Second Day of Utah Convention

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Jan. 18.—Co-operative marketing, transportation problems, a plea for postponement of grazing fees, the relation between sheepmen and the packers and the interests of Indian wool producers provided the material which the National Wool Growers' association covered in the second day of their 56th annual convention at the Hotel Utah today.

H. V. Platt, general manager of the Oregon Short Line railroad, presented the case of the carriers before the convention, saying that in the last analysis the problems of the railroads and the problems of the shippers are irrevocably linked, and that whatever affects the interests of one affects the interests of the other.

Majority of both appropriability and minority reports of the committee on shearing and labor resulted after the convention had discussed the question of reducing both the wages of herders and camp tenders and the fees paid for the shearing of sheep.

The majority report had urged the convention to go on record for a shearing price of 11 1/2 cents a pound as compared with the price of 17 1/2 cents to 20 cents and upwards paid in 1920. W. McLennan, president of the sheep shearers' union offered a price of 12 1/2 cents as being authorized by the executive committee in an effort to let the shearer share in the necessary reduction of costs during the present stringency.

Hugh Campbell of Arizona, invited the national association to hold their next convention at Phoenix.

F. C. Campbell, chief of the livestock interests of the Indian service presented the problems of the 40,000 Indians who own and run more than two million head of sheep, saying that the problems of the Indian growers are those of other sheep interests and that the Indians were anxious to help in the solution of questions pertinent to the industry as a whole.

A missionary who has spent ten years in the mission fields of India, spoke to the young people at the Methodist Episcopal church, Sunday at 3 o'clock. There was special music.

Schools May Use Wireless to Report Activities

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Jan. 18.—Using wireless telegraphy to report basketball, baseball, football, basketball and other sports will be the latest system adopted by Pacific coast institutions, if present plans are carried out.

The University of Washington radio club has suggested establishing a radio system at O. A. C. and the college radio club has accepted. Both institutions are equipped with wireless outfits. Last year the O. A. C. set picked up messages 1200 miles away. J. A. C. will offer a course in wireless the third term of this year.

The University of Oregon, University of California, Oregon Agricultural college, Leland Stanford university, University of Washington and other coast institutions having wireless equipment will be included in the system if they accept the plan. Suitable equipment will be installed to make as efficient organization as possible. It is planned to use this arrangement in conjunction with the Pacific intercollegiate Press association in reporting events of all kinds.

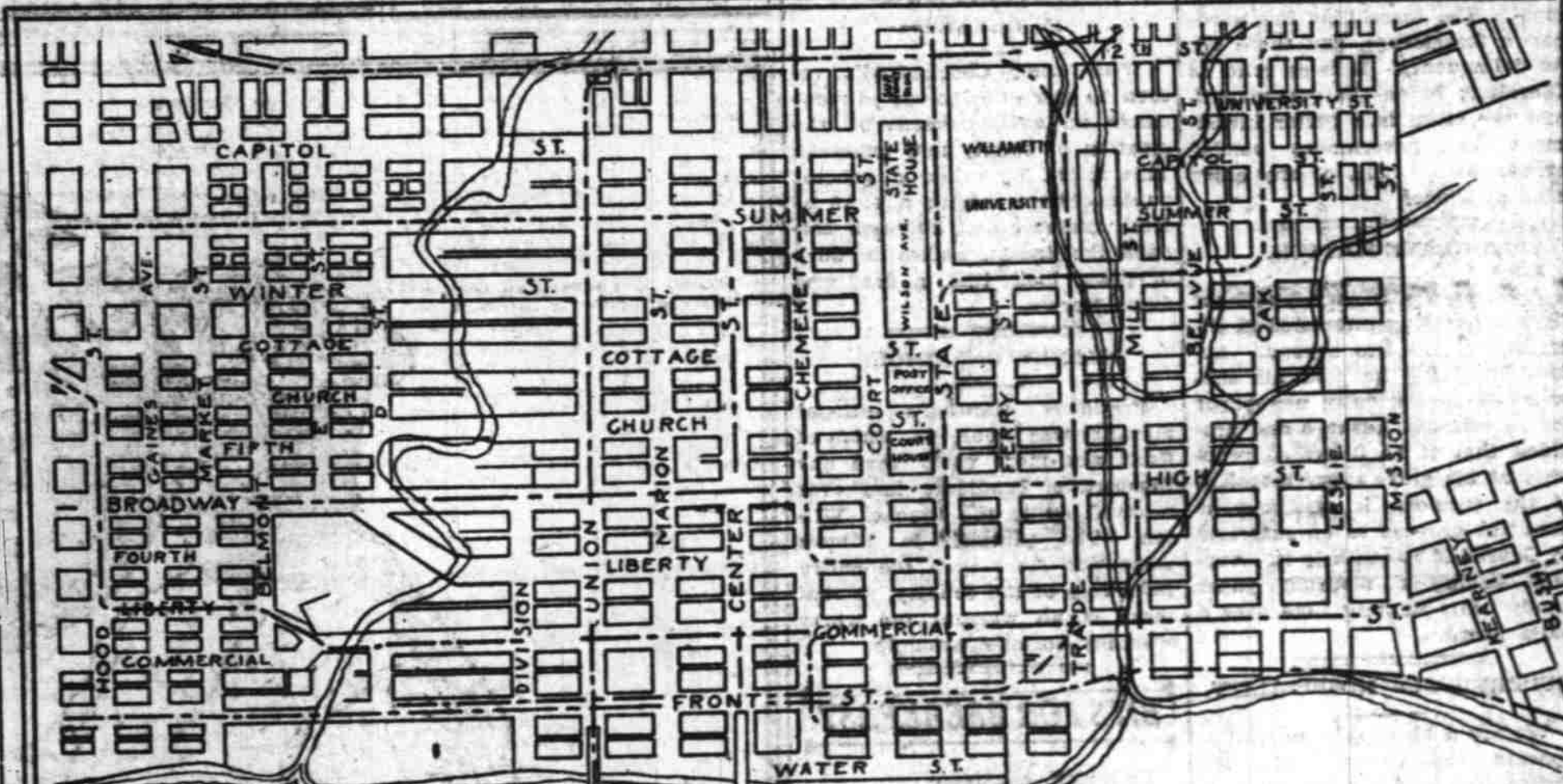
