**NEW COTTAGE IS APPROVED**  
The ways and means committee has approved a plan for a new cottage for the feeble-minded population and its facilities for protecting them and protecting the state against them—the most grimly tremendous problem confronting the state—were told to members of the joint ways and means committee last night by Dr. J. N. Smith, superintendent of the state institution devoted to that purpose. The committee had under consideration the financial needs of the institution as set out in the budget, but will not attempt to pass on the several items aggregating \$337,450, until all possible facts have been obtained through thorough investigation. An exception was the approval of an item of \$11,557.85 for completion of the new cottage authorized by the special session of 1920, considered an emergency measure, and the bill to be introduced will carry the emergency clause so that completion of the building may proceed without delay. The special session appropriated \$40,000 for the purpose. W. C. Knighton of Portland, architect who designed the building, also appeared before the committee in behalf of the measure. Representatives Hurd and Childs and Senator Upton were appointed a special committee to visit the institution Thursday afternoon and report back to the general committee relative to repairs and betterments for which the budget estimates that \$20,250 is needed. Other members of the committee will visit the school at the same time. Senators Staples and Eberhard and Representative Kubi were appointed a special committee to investigate the feasibility of repealing a law passed at the special session of 1920 by which children under 5 years old are admitted to the school for feeble-minded. Dr. Smith deems the law impracticable because it crowds out of the school the class of feeble-minded persons who have become a menace to the state. The ways and means committee will follow the usual policy of obtaining all available data concerning the state departments and institutions. Larger through hearings and their passing on the estimates in executive session later. Tonight representatives of the child welfare commission and of the Oregon products exhibit will appear before the committee.

**BELL WILL INTRODUCE BILL TO KEEP INSTITUTIONS FROM COMMERCIALIZM**  
Senator Bell of Lane county will introduce a bill to prohibit state institutions from commercializing their business. Included will be a provision preventing the journalistic printing plants at the University of Oregon and Oregon Agricultural college from doing any printing except that done for the institution of which they are a part.

**Security Called For**  
The bill provides that all the money so derived shall be deposited by the treasurer of the district in banks designated by the state treasurer. Preference shall be given to banks in counties where the districts are located. The banks selected shall be required to give security to the district for the safe keeping and prompt payment of any moneys placed on deposit. The security may be a surety bond or other form of securities, and these shall be held by the state treasurer for safe keeping.

**Security Called For**  
In event of failure of a bank having the funds on deposit to make prompt payment when demanded, the state treasurer is authorized and directed to sell any or all of the securities, paying the proceeds over to the treasurer of the irrigation or drainage district.

The treasurer of any district failing to comply with the act would be held guilty of a misdemeanor and sentenced to pay a fine not exceeding \$5,000. Appointments confirmed without dissent appointments recently made by Governor Olcott on the state board of health, the board of higher curricula and on the boards of regents of the University of Oregon, Oregon Agricultural college and Oregon Normal school.

The veto of Governor Olcott on senate bill No. 6 of the 1920 special session, validating certain drainage districts, was sustained without dissent, as was another bill increasing certain salaries of county officers in Umatilla county. Another bill is to be substituted.

A senate joint resolution was introduced by Upton authorizing the senate and the house irrigation and drainage districts to meet in joint session and to employ clerical help.

**Holders of Delinquency Certificates May Profit**

A bill introduced by Senator Upton today to amend the law relating to certificates of delinquency provides that holders of such certificates shall be entitled to recover out of the proceeds of the sale of property described in
