crease the salaries district attorneys in Deschutes, Jefferson and Klamath counties. Senator Ryan sent in a bill to pay the state printer \$3000 instead of \$2400 a year, and Senator Lachmund is sponsor for a bill that would make it possible for the governor to increase the salaries of the state parole officer and first and second deputy wardens of the penitentiary.

Banking Fees Low From Senator Robertson comes a measure to increase the fees which banks are required to pay the state banking department for bank examinations. It is said to have the approval of most of the banking men of the state for the reason that it gives the department more time for examinations and will make more help possible.

Continuing his onslaught upon the purse sealers, Norblin, of Clatsop has introduced a bill to prohibit the sale or purchase of salmon caught by purse seines in the Pacific ocean within ten miles of the Oregon coast.

The gravity test for gasoline sold in Oregon would be eliminated if a bill by Senator Hare were to pass. To the present law requiring the test is attributed the gasoline famine which the state suffered once or twice in the last two years.

It is understood a bill will be introduced to establish the government test in Oregon. Retailers Affected Senator Bell is author of a measure, which if pushed, may bring a lobby to Salem. It would regulate the sale of garments and certain kinds of cloth by retail-
