

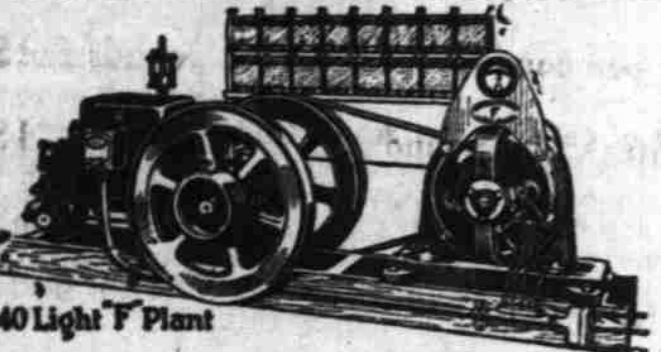

LAWMAKERS GO TO EUGENE TODAY

Last Minute Bills Flood Both Houses of the Legislature

Both the upper and lower houses of the legislature adjourned yesterday, the senate at noon and the house at 2:30, to make the trip to University of Oregon today. They will convene again at 11 o'clock Monday morning. Today being the twentieth day of the session and, according to custom, the last day on which bills were entered in the house yesterday during the morning session, but owing to misunderstanding, the time limit was placed at Monday. Sixty-seven bills were introduced in the house and 14 in the senate, making a total of 254 bills now before the lower body and 198 before the upper.

Senate bills introduced yesterday: S. B. 185, Ellis—Relating to trespass on unfenced lands. S. B. 186, by joint Union-Wal-lowa delegations—Appropriating \$5000 annually for support of Union livestock show at Union. S. B. 187, by committee on fishing industries—Amending state fishing code. S. B. 188, by joint committee on irrigation and drainage—Providing for transfer of power license fees to survey fund. S. B. 189, by committee on revision of laws—Amending statutes relating to wills and bequests. S. B. 190, by committee on revision of laws—Repealing section abating foreclosure of mortgage of soldier or sailor during service. S. B. 191, Staples—Regulating sale of dairy bulls and creating dairy bull registration board. S. B. 192, by Upton and Moser—Amending statutes relating to bids on machinery and supplies to be purchased by counties. S. B. 193, Rittner—Providing a system of discounts for grains of inferior grades. S. B. 194, Farrell—Providing that no building, either public or private, shall be erected in Oregon for housing and care of children who come under purview of child welfare act without written approval of child welfare commission as to type and general architecture. S. B. 195, Farrell—Placing all child caring agencies and institutions under supervision of child welfare commission and appropriating \$20,000 for commission. S. B. 196, Farrell—Relating to adoptions of wards of child caring agencies and institutions. S. B. 197, Farrell—Requiring approval of child welfare commission for all child caring institutions. S.
